# THE MOST HOLY TRINITY

## FROM THE PASTOR

We have begun Ordinary Time, with the closing of the Easter Season last Sunday. Today we celebrate the Feast of the Holy Trinity and next week the Feast of Corpus Christ (the Body & Blood of Jesus). Then the Gospels will return to Luke, pretty much until Advent.

As we celebrate this time of the year, it does not mean our lives are ordinary. Quite the contrary; they seem to be more and more active as we get older, which is a good thing. Sometimes, it seems that we can't keep up with all that is happening in our lives. This is one reason the church gives us Ordinary Time. With the approach of summer, it is a time to step back, relax and allow the presence of Christ to permeate our lives as we bask in the joy and warmth of the sun. We may find this difficult to do at times, but vacations give us the opportunity to forget it all and enjoy some time with family and friends away from the normal routine. This is one reason we need to enjoy each moment of every day the Lord gives us.

Last Sunday, President Barak Obama addressed the graduates at Rutgers University. He did so on the 250th anniversary of its Founding. Rutgers was founded in 1766, as Queens College. It was only much later that it changed its name to Rutgers. He was the first sitting president to give the Commencement Address at Rutgers in its history. I believe that the last sitting president who gave the Commencement Address at a University in New Jersey was Ronald Reagan, who addressed the graduates of Seton Hall University in the 1980's. It is a prestigious event to have the President of the United States address the graduates of any college or university, but even more so, here in New Jersey. Regardless of one's political persuasion, it is an awesome experience for graduates to listen to the president speak to them.

The Feast of the Holy Trinity celebrates that unique relationship among Father, Son & Spirit that reveals to us the glory of God. But the feast also celebrates the unique way that each person of the Trinity has been revealed in human history, beginning with the creation of the world, the presence of the Son who has shown us how to live as a faithful disciple, and the Holy Spirit who guides us in the way of the Lord. While it is easy to say that the Trinity is a mystery, we must remember that this intimate relationship has been revealed to us to sustain our faith.

When we were baptized, or when we begin our liturgical celebrations, and every time we put our hand into the Baptismal Font, we sign ourselves "In the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit." We do it so often we never give it a second thought. But the Trinity, the Sign of the Cross, are so much a part of our lives that we cannot live without them.

As we sign ourselves each day with the Sign of the Cross, it is always good to remember that when we do this, we recall the life of the Trinity in our lives, and how God has chosen to show himself in the past as well as in the present situation in which we find ourselves. In his wisdom, God knew that we could not handle the revelation of all three Persons of the Trinity at once, so he revealed each at its proper time for us so that we could come to believe more easily in the Trinity as Three Persons in One God. Each Person is equal to the other, but they are One God who is in all and over all and pervades our lives with the presence of the Trinity.

Next Sunday is Corpus Christi, or the Feast of the Body and Blood of Christ, the Eucharist. Following the 12:00 noon Mass, we will have a procession with the Blessed Sacrament from the church to the front of the school and then going behind the school and then back into the church. Then we will have Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament. I certainly invite all of you to join us for the procession, even if you were at a previous Mass that day or Saturday night. This is a celebration as well of who we are as the Body of Christ, called to be Eucharist for each other.

### CELEBRATE MEMORIAL DAY WITH THE ST. JAMES NATURE AND HIKING CLUB

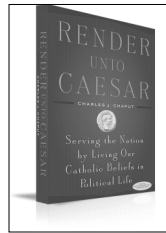

## PARISH SCHOOL NEWS

### AN INCREDIBLE STORY OF PERSISTENCE

I love being the principal at Saint James the Apostle School but there are subjects I miss teaching. This year I really missed reading Hana's Suitcase with the 5th grade who begins reading this book in April which (National Holocaust Remembrance Month) and finishes in May around the main character's birthday. It's a story we can all relate to which is why I devote this week's column to sharing it with you.

Hana's Suitcase is a non-fiction selection written in 2001 by Canadian author Karen Levine. In the book, two stories unfold. One story is of a child, Hana Brady, her brother George and their family in the years leading up to the Holocaust. The other story is told in present day (2001) about a woman named Fumiko Ishioka, who is the curator of the Tokyo Holocaust Education Resource Center (THERC). The mission of the THERC is to give students in Japan "*opportunities to learn what discrimination, prejudice and intolerance could lead to and how important it is to appreciate differences and be respectful with each other to make this world a better, more compassionate place.*" Fumiko writes to many different Holocaust museums looking for artifacts to display at the Center. One day she receives a suitcase in the mail with the name "Hana Brady" written on the outside. After receiving the suitcase, Fumiko and her students are full of questions and Fumiko is determined to find out more about Hana Brady.

From chapter to chapter, the third person narrative is told from Hana's and Fumiko's perspectives. The reader is offered glimpses of what life was like in the late 1930s and early 1940s for the Brady family, who was Jewish, and for Fumiko, in early 2000, and the obstacles she faced to find out all she could about Hana Brady. Fifth graders learn how quickly life changed for Jewish people during this time, being forced from their own homes, living in the Theresienstadt ghetto and the enduring the harshness of the Auschwitz concentration camp. Sadly, Fumiko discovers Hana perished at age 13 at Auschwitz. Fumiko also discovers Hana had a brother, and that he is still alive living in Toronto, Canada and decides to write to him. At age 72, George's life is changed when he receives a package from Fumiko inquiring about Hana opening up a painful part of his life. George eventually travels to Japan to see Hana's suitcase and help Fumiko understand who Hana was and what her short life had been like.

The 5<sup>th</sup> grade just concluded reading the book and engaged in a variety of writing activities with their teacher, Miss Cristin Zavocki. If Hana were still alive today, she would have celebrated her 85<sup>th</sup> birthday this month. In her honor, the class celebrated with a cake decorated like Hana's suitcase. Hana's childhood dream was to become a teacher. George helped her realize her dream and at age 88, he continues to tell Hana's story to this day, most recently traveling with Fumiko to Seattle this past February to attend the opening of a children's performance of "Hana's Suitcase". Like the 5<sup>th</sup> grade classes before them and like the students half way around the world in Tokyo, our 5<sup>th</sup> graders learned valuable lessons about "*what discrimination, prejudice and intolerance could lead to and how important it is to appreciate differences and be respectful with each other to make this world a better, more compassionate place.*"
