## **MESSAGE FROM THE PASTOR**

Today is SUPER BOWL SUNDAY!!! Under normal circumstances, families and friends would gather either at home or in a restaurant to watch the game and enjoy some food. The stadium would be filled with fanatic football fans. This year, things are different because of COVID-19. Gatherings will be smaller. There will only be a few thousand spectators in the stadium, and they will all be health care workers from around the country. We will see what happens next year.

Today's readings remind us of the seriousness of speaking for God. While Job reflects his restlessness with what God has called him to do, Paul reflects his willingness to preach the Gospel to whomever will listen. Jesus reminds his apostles that his mission is to bring the Good News to the residents of the towns and villages he visits. It shows the seriousness of his ministry and that it is not meant for just a few people, but for as many as he would encounter in his travels.

This mission is just as serious for us today. We don't have to go from town to town to convince people of our faith in Jesus. We accomplish this by the way we live in communion with God as expressed in Christ Jesus. But our mission also connects us to one another in the way we speak and act with each other. The Good News must radiate in who we are as God's people, in what we believe and how we make that belief real for others. Not everyone will listen or even pay attention to what we say and do. But that doesn't make the mission any less serious or important.

As we approach the Season of Lent, this would be a good time to look at our relationship with God, what we need to do to improve it, if necessary, and what we need to do to be a better sign of Jesus for one another. This is always a good goal for us any time of the year.

Since we are still receiving Christmas donations, the final figures will be in this column next week.

## MESSAGE FROM FR. JOE Regarding Attending Mass during Covid-19

Dear Fellow Saint James Parishioners:

It is great to be back together in church for Mass, but things are a little different. Senior citizens and those with underlying medical conditions are encouraged to remain at home and watch the Sunday online 10:30AM Mass, which we will continue to live-stream.

If you do come to church for Mass, please remember the following:

- 1. You must wear a mask to enter the church and you must keep your mask on, at all times while in the church, including during Mass.
- 2. As you go from the Gathering Area into the church, please use the appropriate door to enter and exit the church.
- 3. Please observe the one-way aisles, which are marked with blue tape on the floor.
- 4. You must maintain social distancing while in the church.
- 5. Half of the pews have been taped off to maintain social distancing. There are pieces of blue tape on each pew where you can sit. They are also on the floor by the back walls for those who prefer to stand. This area is also marked for social distancing.
- 6. Family members can sit together, but everyone else must sit 6 feet apart.
- 7. The weekly collection baskets will not be passed from parishioner to parishioner. They will be on the baptismal font. Please drop in your donation as you enter or exit the church.
- 8. There is no procession of the bread and wine ("bringing up the gifts").
- 9. Please do not shake hands when sharing the sign of peace. Instead, wave, nod, or bow slightly.
- 10. There are three Communion stations: one in the center, one by the organ, and one by the ambo. The ushers will direct you to maintain social distance.
- 11. Hosts can no longer be placed directly on a parishioner's tongue by a priest, deacon, or Eucharistic Minister. You must receive the Host in your hand and place it on your tongue. There is no receiving from the Cup.
- 12. When it is your turn to receive Communion, approach the priest or deacon, receive the Host in your hand, step aside, raise or lower your mask, and place the Host on your tongue. Immediately replace your mask over your mouth.
- 13. The candles in the Gathering Area have been turned off and they are taped.
- 14. There are no printed bulletins. Bulletins are posted online on the parish website.
- 15. The Worship books have been removed from church. You may bring your own booklet, iPad or IPhone to use during Mass.
- 16. You will also notice that everything that can be touched has been removed from the church. There is no Holy Water.
- 17. Once Mass is over, please quickly exit the church so that the pews can be sanitized for the next Mass.
- 18. If you want to socialize with others whom you may not have seen in a while, please do so outside of church and not in the Gathering Area.

If you have any questions or are unsure of what to do while in church, please ask an usher. I ask your patience as we attempt to navigate through all of this. We realize this is a very different situation for all of us. It can work if we work together. If you have any questions or concerns, please do not hesitate to let me know.

#### GOSPEL: Mark 1:29-39

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#### Saint of the Week:

### Memorial of St. Scholastica, Feast Day February 10.

Saint Scholastica was the twin sister of Saint Benedict. Benedict studied in Rome but then decided to devote all of his life to the search for God. He organized several community dwellings and finally established a very important monastery at Monte Cassino. Then Scholastica helped her brother found a community of religious women about five miles south of his monastery.

Scholastica and Benedict visited together only once a year. They would spend the day praying and speaking of God and the spiritual life.

When Benedict said he had to return to the monastery, Scholastica begged him to stay and talk awhile longer. Benedict refused, saying that his rule required that the monks be in their monastery at night. Heartbroken, Scholastica folded her hands, put her head on the table, and quietly wept and prayed. As she prayed, a storm began, so terrible that no one could venture out. "What have you done?" Benedict exclaimed to his sister. She explained that since he had refused the favor she had asked, she had turned to God instead, and God granted it. Benedict and Scholastica continued their conversation and prayer until morning. Three days later, Scholastica died. The brother and sister had enjoyed their final conversation. Benedict had her buried in the tomb he had built for himself.

Pope Francis has dedicated this year, 2021, to St. Joseph. As we think about St. Joseph's role in the lives of Jesus and Mary we find events that required great hope:

- \* Joseph was a dreamer. He had to hope that following the directives he received in his dreams were indeed God's will for the Holy Family.
  - \* He had to hope that he would be successful in doing so.
  - \* How shocked and confused he must have been when Mary told him she was pregnant. Should he have her stoned to death according to the law? No, rather he followed the angel's advice to take her as his wife. Again, he hoped that he was doing the right thing.
  - \* As a husband and father he faced severe trials: No room in the inn; Jesus lost for three days; confusion upon hearing Simeon's and Ann's prophesies in the temple.

Mary is sure hope (*Lumen Gentium*). Joseph is creative hope; that is, he listened to the messages of his dreams and he acted with faith and hope. Both Mary and Joseph were hope-filled because of their love for Jesus who is hope. As we live in this world with its challenges let us embrace Jesus and follow Mary and Joseph who in moments of

difficulty and crises were able to look ahead and live daily lives with hope in the future. You are the future generation who can respond to the present culture with prayer, faith and action. Dream your dreams for the future, and pray for the grace to know what is God's will for you to act as inspired by the Holy Spirit. In you we have hope.
