MESSAGE FROM THE PASTOR

His mission, like that of all deacons, is to serve the church in whatever way he can to enrich his life and the lives of the people he touches. Hugh will be able to proclaim the Gospel, preach the Word, celebrate baptisms, weddings, wakes and burial services, and serve at the altar during liturgy. I had the privilege to vest Hugh with the stole and dalmatic, which are symbols of the diaconate ministry. **CONGRATULATIONS**, also to Maggie and Hugh's family for their support of Hugh during his preparation for ordination. **WELCOME, HUGH!! MAY GOD BLESS YOU AND YOUR MINISTRY TO THE PEOPLE OF SAINT JAMES PARISH!!!**

Do you ever think of what you want from the Lord? Some of us may want a miracle to convince us of his presence in our lives. Some may want problems in life to go away. Others may want to deepen a relationship with the Lord that already exists. There may be many other things we want from the Lord. But did you ever wonder what the Lord wants from us? We might get an idea from today's Gospel.

The Word of God is given to us so that we can continue to develop our relationship with God. Sometimes, though, we become distracted by what is happening in our lives and we lose touch with the impact of the Word. This is easy to do, especially during this pandemic because we are concerned about being safe and following the directives given to us. Yet, if we are open and receptive to the Word and what it expects of us, then we develop a deeper relationship with God that helps us through difficult times like this. We are invited and challenged to allow the Word to permeate our being so that the Word becomes reflected in who we are and everything we do, no matter the circumstances.

Our lives have to be the good soil to allow the Word to grow so that we radiate the Word to one another. For most of us, this is not difficult because we are willing to hear what the Word is saying to us, not with our ears, but with our heart. That is where the Lord touches us. Once the Word touches us, it also transforms us into an image of the God who calls us as his own. We may be surprised by the way we speak and act towards each other. This becomes a way of life for us all, and we can be grateful to God for allowing us the privilege of experiencing his presence in the Word, and to be guided by the Spirit to live as a follower of the Lord.

There is no question that this summer will be a different one for many of us. While many will be enjoying time at their houses at the shore, those of us who were planning to travel to other states or countries have to think about returning home and going into quarantine for two weeks. That's one of the effects of COVID-19 on our world. Whatever you and your family happen to do this summer, please be safe. Wear the masks and social distance from others. These may be part of the new normal for us. It is always better to take precautions than to be infected with COVID-19.

MESSAGE FROM FR. JOE

Regarding Attending Mass during Covid-19

Dear Fellow Saint James Parishioners:

It is great to be back together in church for Mass, but things are a little different. Please don't forget to call the parish office or email me (jbarbone@msn.com) by noon on Saturdays to let us know which Mass you plan to attend. Senior citizens and those with underlying medical conditions are encouraged to remain at home and watch the Sunday online 10:30AM Mass, which we will continue to live-stream.

If you do come to church for Mass, please remember the following:

1. You must wear a mask to enter the church and you must keep your mask on at all times while in the church, including during Mass.
2. As you go from the Gathering Area into the church, please use the appropriate door to enter and exit the church.
3. Please observe the one-way aisles, which are marked with blue tape on the floor.
4. You must maintain social distancing while in the church.
5. Half of the pews have been taped off to maintain social distancing. There are pieces of blue tape on each pew where you can sit. They are also on the floor by the back walls for those who prefer to stand. This area is also marked for social distancing.
6. Family members can sit together, but everyone else must sit 6 feet apart.
7. The weekly collection baskets will not be passed from parishioner to parishioner. They will be on the baptismal font. Please drop in your donation as you enter or exit the church.
8. There is no procession of the bread and wine ("bringing up the gifts").
9. Please do not shake hands when giving the sign of peace. Instead, wave, nod, or bow slightly.
10. There are three Communion stations: one in the center, one by the organ, and one by the ambo. The ushers will direct you to maintain social distance.
11. When it is your turn to receive Communion, approach the priest or deacon, receive the Host in your hand, raise or lower your mask, and place the Host on your tongue. Immediately replace your mask over your mouth.
12. Hosts can no longer be placed directly on a parishioner's tongue by a priest, deacon, or Eucharistic Minister. You must receive the Host in your hand and place it on your tongue. There is no receiving from the Cup.
13. The candles in the Gathering Area have been turned off and they are taped.
14. There are no printed bulletins. Bulletins are posted online on the parish website.
15. The Worship books have been removed from church. You may bring your own booklet, iPad or iPhone to use during Mass.
16. You will also notice that everything that can be touched has been removed from the church. There is no Holy Water.
17. Once Mass is over, please quickly exit the church so that the pews can be sanitized for the next Mass.
18. If you want to socialize with others whom you may not have seen in a while, please do so outside of church and not in the Gathering Area.

If you have any questions or are unsure of what to do while in church, please ask an usher. I ask your patience as we attempt to navigate through all of this. We realize this is a very different situation for all of us. It can work if we work together. If you have any questions or concerns, please do not hesitate to let me know.

Please remember, if you are attending Mass in person, we must adhere to the guidelines found on page 4 of this bulletin.

For those not feeling comfortable returning to church to attend Mass, we will continue to offer our virtual 10:30AM Sunday Mass.

Governor Murphy announced the guidelines for the reopening of public schools in September. Once the Springfield Superintendent announces the guidelines for our public school district we will be better able to plan for our classes.

Next Saturday a group of our children will receive the Sacrament of First Eucharist. While we are unable to accommodate entire families due to the limited number of people permitted inside the church, we will live stream the Masses through our Facebook page and YouTube channel for everyone to virtually join us.

Do you have a school aged child who has been baptized but has not received religious education or been prepared for the sacraments? Do you, or someone you know, have a special needs child in need of sacramental preparation? Please call the Religious Education office. We are here to help; I encourage all families, but especially those with children preparing for the Sacrament of First Eucharist, to continue attending our virtual Sunday morning Mass on either YouTube or Facebook at 10:30AM. This is a great opportunity to answer your child's questions during the actual Mass without worrying about disturbing anyone sitting around you. Participating in virtual Mass will also reinforce the prayers that we recite and help the children to acclimate themselves when we are reunited in church again. Please plan on joining us as we pray the Rosary every Monday evening at 7:00PM on Facebook or Zoom.

As we continue to discover new ways of sharing our faith, we also need to find new ways to catechize our children. If you have ideas or suggestions, I encourage you to contact me.

Any family new to our program or with a child entering 1st grade (Kindergarten is optional) please email me so we can arrange to speak. Baptismal certificates are required for all new students regardless of grade at the time of registration.

GOSPEL: Matthew 13:1-23

On that day, Jesus went out of the house and sat down by the sea.
Such large crowds gathered around him that he got into a boat and sat down, and the whole crowd stood along the shore. And he spoke to them at length in parables, saying: "A sower went out to sow.
And as he sowed, some seed fell on the path, and birds came and ate it up.
Some fell on rocky ground, where it had little soil. It sprang up at once because the soil was not deep, and when the sun rose it was scorched, and it withered for lack of roots.
Some seed fell among thorns, and the thorns grew up and choked it.
But some seed fell on rich soil, and produced fruit, a hundred or sixty or thirtyfold.
Whoever has ears ought to hear."
The disciples approached him and said, "Why do you speak to them in parables?"
He said to them in reply, "Because knowledge of the mysteries of the kingdom of heaven has been granted to you, but to them it has not been granted.
To anyone who has, more will be given and he will grow rich; from anyone who has not, even what he has will be taken away.
This is why I speak to them in parables, because *they look but do not see and hear but do not listen or understand.*
Isaiah's prophecy is fulfilled in them, which says: *You shall indeed hear but not understand, you shall indeed look but never see.*
Gross is the heart of this people,

they will hardly hear with their ears, they have closed their eyes, lest they see with their eyes and hear with their ears and understand with their hearts and be converted, and I heal them.

"But blessed are your eyes, because they see, and your ears, because they hear.

Amen, I say to you, many prophets and righteous people

longed to see what you see but did not see it, and to hear what you hear but did not hear it.

"Hear then the parable of the sower.

The seed sown on the path is the one who hears the word of the kingdom without understanding it,

and the evil one comes and steals away what was sown in his heart.

The seed sown on rocky ground is the one who hears the word and receives it at once with joy.

But he has no root and lasts only for a time.

When some tribulation or persecution comes because of the word, he immediately falls away.

The seed sown among thorns is the one who hears the word,

but then worldly anxiety and the lure of riches choke the word

and it bears no fruit.

But the seed sown on rich soil

is the one who hears the word and understands it, who indeed bears fruit and yields a hundred or sixty or thirtyfold."

Priest / Deacon: The Gospel of the Lord.....

R. Praise to You, Lord Jesus Christ!

Gospel Reflection:

Jesus told his disciples that not everyone would understand his parables. Did Jesus mean to say that he was deliberately confusing or hiding the meaning of his stories from his listeners? Very likely not. Jesus was speaking from experience. He was aware that some who heard his parables refused to understand them. It was not that they could not intellectually understand them, but rather, their hearts were closed to what Jesus was saying. They had already made up their minds to not believe. God can only reveal the secrets of his kingdom - that which is hidden to the spiritually blind - to those who hunger for God and humbly submit to his truth.

What can makes us ineffective or unresponsive to God's word? Preoccupation with other things can distract us from what is truly important and worthwhile. And letting our hearts and minds be consumed with material things can easily weigh us down and draw us away from the heavenly treasure that lasts for eternity. God's word can only take root in a receptive heart which is docile and ready to hear what God has to say.

"Lord Jesus, faith in your word is the way to wisdom, and to ponder your divine plan is to grow in the truth. Open my eyes to your deeds, and my ears to the sound of your call, that I may understand your will for my life and live according to it"







Saints of the Week.....

July 14th: Saint Kateri Tekakwitha.... is the first Native American to be recognized as a saint by the Catholic Church. She was born in 1656, in the Mohawk village of Ossernenon. Her mother was an Algonquin who was captured by the Mohawks and who took a Mohawk chief for her husband.

She contracted smallpox as a four-year-old child, which scarred her skin. The scars were a source of humiliation in her youth. She was commonly seen wearing a blanket to hide her face. Worse, her entire family died during the outbreak. Kateri Tekakwitha was subsequently raised by her uncle, who was the chief of a Mohawk clan.

Kateri was known as a skilled worker, who was diligent and patient. However, she refused to marry. When her adoptive parents proposed a suitor to her, she refused to entertain the proposal. They punished her by giving her more work to do, but she did not give in. Instead, she remained quiet and diligent. Eventually they were forced to relent and accept that she had no interest in marriage.

At age 19, Kateri Tekakwitha converted to Catholicism, taking a vow of chastity and pledging to marry only Jesus Christ. Her decision was very unpopular with her adoptive parents and their neighbors. Some of her neighbors started rumors of sorcery. To avoid persecution, she traveled to a Christian native community south of Montreal.

When she died at the age of twenty-four, the scars on her face disappeared and she was beautiful. Kateri's last words were, "Jesus, I love you."

July 15th: Saint Bonaventure..... known as "the seraphic doctor," he was born at Bagnoregio, in the Lazio region of central Italy, in 1221. He received the name of Bonaventure in consequence of an exclamation of St. Francis of Assisi, when, in response to the pleading of the child's mother, the saint prayed for John's recovery from a dangerous illness, and, foreseeing the future greatness of the little John, cried out "O Buona ventura"- O good fortune!

At the age of twenty-two St. Bonaventure entered the Franciscan Order. Having made his vows, he was sent to Paris to complete his studies under the celebrated doctor Alexander of Hales, an Englishman and a Franciscan. After the latter's death he continued his course under his successor, John of Rochelle. In Paris he became the intimate friend of the great St. Thomas Aquinas. He received the degree of Doctor, together with St. Thomas Aquinas, ceding to his friend against the latter's inclination, the honor of having it first conferred upon him. Like St. Thomas Aquinas, he enjoyed the friendship of the holy King, St. Louis.

At the age of thirty-five he was chosen General of his Order and restored a perfect calm where peace had been disturbed by internal dissensions. He did much for his Order and composed The Life of St. Francis. He also assisted at the translation of the prayers of St. Anthony of Padua. He died while he was assisting at the Second Council of Lyons, on July 15, 1274.

INTENTIONS FOR THE SICK

At the *General Intercessions* we pray for the sick. Our prayers for the sick are very important, especially in critical times of sudden illness, surgery or worsening condition. We will continue to pray for and mention the names of the sick. When the condition improves, please call the Rectory so that the name can be removed from the list.

COMMUNION AT MASS

If you cannot walk up the aisle to receive Holy Communion and do not want to sit in the first pew, please let one of the ushers know and an Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion will come to you at the end of the procession and administer the Body & Blood to you.

RECEIVING COMMUNION

A reminder that during the Covid-19 restrictions, the Eucharist can only be received in the hands. It is good to remind ourselves of the reverence needed when we receive the Body and Blood of Christ.

When we approach the altar please remove any gloves beforehand.
Remember to bow slightly without being ostentatious and reply "Amen".
If communion runs out, please wait in line for the Minister to return.
