SEVENTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

FROM THE PASTOR

It is said that bread is the staff of life. There is a plenitude of different types of bread, some of which are familiar to many of us while others are not. Yet, whatever group or individual consumes bread, there is no doubt that bread is an important part of our diet. It is no wonder then that Jesus offers bread to those who have been following him.

For Jesus, as the Good Sphered, always wanted to take care of the needs of those who followed him. In a dry, arid region like that where Jesus lived, it was always important to carry enough food and water for any journey. Without it, one could easily pass out and possibly die. So, Jesus wanted to make sure there was enough bread for all. The miracle of the loaves that fed so many people always makes us step back in awe.

But there are really two levels to this miracle. One is what Jesus did in multiplying whatever bread the disciples had. But Jesus also encouraged the people to share with each other what each had brought along on the journey. This would make sure everyone had enough to eat and were satisfied.

Another way to look at this miracle is from the perspective of our mothers and grandmothers. When they have unexpected company, they can take whatever they have in the refrigerator and pantry and quickly put a meal together with ease, so their guests have something to eat.

For us, the Eucharist can feed us all because the bread is broken and given to all of us, and the cup is passed around so that we can be satisfied with the Body of Christ, the Bread of Life. Every time we gather around the Lord's Table, our hunger is satisfied with the Body of Christ and our thirst is quenched with the Blood of Christ. The irony of this is that the more we receive the Eucharist, the more we need to come back and be satisfied once again. But the Eucharist is more than just what we receive; it is who we are as God's people. Once we are fed and nourished at the table, then we have to go forward and feed one another with the gift of Jesus as the Body of Christ. When we respond to the needs of others, we do so not just as an individual, or a group, but as the Body of Christ, sent forth to transform the world.

We give to one another what we have, our time, our talent and our treasure, even if we think it may seem like nothing. Whatever it may be, it is a way to help others experience the wonder that Jesus is for us, as he sends us forth to build his kingdom on earth.

Next week, I'll write about our anniversaries and our Feast Day.

On behalf of our entire parish, the staff and myself, I want to express our gratitude and thanks to Deacon Art for the years that he has served our parish. As Art and Nancy move on to another parish, may they do so with our prayers and good wishes. **THANK YOU, ART & NANCY, for enriching our lives and the life of our parish. Our parish Religious Education Program is a partnership between our parish and our parents to support the families in the spiritual development of their children. All children are welcome here at Saint James and I look forward to the opportunity of welcoming you to our parish.

This partnership works best when we work together, each doing our part to ensure the children are receiving the foundation they need to develop a life-long relationship with Jesus Christ. Together, we are one family, one Body of Christ and a true sign of His presence in our world.

It is our goal to greet each child with an open heart and eagerness to share our love of God with them. We offer the traditional classroom setting (Sunday mornings or Tuesday afternoons), home study (grades 3-7), and our 8th graders meet consecutively for two groups of 10 weeks. We also offer individual instruction for children with special needs.

Returning families are reminded, if you haven't already done so, to mail or drop off your 2018-2019 registration form before leaving for vacation! If you are new to our parish or have a child entering 1st grade in September, please call the Religious Education Office for information about registering as a parishioner and / or registering your child(ren) for classes. Baptism Certificates are needed at the time of registration. Kindergarten Classes, while optional, are offered only on Sunday mornings.

Ann Marie Gesualdo, the 8th Grade Program / Confirmation Coordinator will be emailing the parents of incoming 8th graders with details about the 8th grade program for the Fall. She will also communicate with the parish school 8th grade families before classes begin in September.



MUSIC MINISTRY NEWS

Mr. Matthew Wilson, Director of Music Ministry



Last week, in an effort to heighten worship through sung prayer for the anniversaries of our parish and school, Steinway and Sons Pianos of New York City sponsored us by lending one of their seven-foot-long Model B pianos. Steinway and Sons makes one of the best pianos in the world known for its rich tone and solidly build quality. To give you an idea of the reliability of these instruments, the specific piano they lent to us has all the original parts, and was built between 1940 and 1941. From its built date, it has been repeatedly taken apart, loaded on to a box truck, and shipped all over the tri-state area as a rental/demo piano for concerts, fundraisers, churches, schools, etc.

The reason we borrowed the piano last week is because our parish piano, an Otto Altenburg that was generously donated to the parish in 2002 is quickly beginning to fail. The soundboard is beginning to crack, the pin block is loose, the hammers are hardening, and repairing this would cost much more than it is worth. This is partially a result of the fluctuating temperature and humidity in the church beyond our control. Our current piano was simply not designed to fill the large space of our new church, nor was it built to a quality that can withstand the abusive climate fluctuations. The good news is that our piano is still playable, and to promote its longevity, it will soon be moved into Hatcher Hall, where it has much less of a demand to fulfill and will be used by the school students for their concerts and prayer services.

We are strongly considering 7-foot Boston piano, a sister company of Steinway and Sons, with a respectable price tag. This Boston piano is the best practical investment for our space, and we anticipate we will get about 60 years of beautiful music from it, compared to the estimated 15 years of brands of lesser quality. To offset the cost to the parish, the music ministry has set up a series of fundraisers specifically for this piano, and our first fundraiser will take place in September. More details will be included in next week's bulletin. Donations will be gratefully accepted and all donors will be appropriately acknowledged for their support. It's important to understand that this is not only a good investment financially, but also is a good investment to heighten the versatility of our music ministry. This investment is only possible with your support.


