MESSAGE FROM THE PASTOR

There is no question that we have all adjusted to the effects of COVID-19, whether we like it or not. The concern is not just for now, but what will happen in the fall when everything is open, including the schools. It is very easy to become weary of all of these demands and wonder what life will be like when we can get back to "normal," whatever that is. All of these changes may even make some people want to give up and hibernate when all of this is over. Unfortunately, no one knows when the end will be and if it will happen in the near future.

Hopefully, as we continue to celebrate both weekday and weekend Masses, we will receive a renewed sense of hope about what happens to all of us. In today's Gospel, we are reminded by Jesus that he has given us an insight into his relationship with the Father. This relationship is what sustains us and nurtures us, as it also encourages us to live as followers of the Lord. There should be a great deal of comfort in this relationship and in knowing that the Lord is watching over us and caring for us through our responses to each other. If there is one thing we have discovered from the pandemic, it is that we have become more attentive to one another, no matter where we meet each other. But this is inherent in the message of the Gospel since Jesus showed us how to do this.

Jesus invites us to place our burdens on him, as he replaces them with his abiding presence and love. Whether we have struggled with being at home during COVID-19, dealing with children who had to learn online and not in school with their friends, or trying to deal with parents who may be frail and elderly, Jesus offers us a respite for our lives. As a result of this, we can be energized to go forward as a sign of hope for others, as we reflect the presence of Jesus to them through us. As we move around more freely now that the stay-at-home order is lifted, we do have to be careful not to jeopardize ourselves or others by acting before thinking.

The time spent around the Lord's Table, reflecting on the Word and Breaking Bread together reassures us that his presence is as real today as it was before the pandemic. We always have to remember that just as Jesus is the sign of the father's love for us, we are a sign of Jesus for all we meet. As we seek comfort from the Lord, we may be the only person who offers comfort to those we meet each day. It might be our personality, our demeanor, or what we say and do that helps others experience the gentleness of our God.

REMINDER: Now that there are more adults walking and riding bicycles, and more children playing in the streets or riding bikes, we need to be extra careful as we drive around town. With the end of school, many children feel they are free and want to enjoy time with their friends. As we try to keep ourselves and others safe by wearing masks and social distancing, we also want to keep our children safe as they try to enjoy life during this pandemic.

MESSAGE FROM FR. JOE

Regarding Attending Mass during Covid-19

Dear Fellow Saint James Parishioners:

It is great to be back together in church for Mass, but things are a little different. Please don't forget to call the parish office or email me (jbarbone@msn.com) by noon on Saturdays to let us know which Mass you plan to attend. Senior citizens and those with underlying medical conditions are encouraged to remain at home and watch the Sunday online 10:30AM Mass, which we will continue to live-stream.

If you do come to church for Mass, please remember the following:

1. You must wear a mask to enter the church and you must keep your mask on at all times while in the church, including during Mass.
2. As you go from the Gathering Area into the church, please use the appropriate door to enter and exit the church.
3. Please observe the one-way aisles, which are marked with blue tape on the floor.
4. You must maintain social distancing while in the church.
5. Half of the pews have been taped off to maintain social distancing. There are pieces of blue tape on each pew where you can sit. They are also on the floor by the back walls for those who prefer to stand. This area is also marked for social distancing.
6. Family members can sit together, but everyone else must sit 6 feet apart.
7. The weekly collection baskets will not be passed from parishioner to parishioner. They will be on the baptismal font. Please drop in your donation as you enter or exit the church.
8. There is no procession of the bread and wine ("bringing up the gifts").
9. Please do not shake hands when giving the sign of peace. Instead, wave, nod, or bow slightly.
10. There are three Communion stations: one in the center, one by the organ, and one by the ambo. The ushers will direct you to maintain social distance.
11. When it is your turn to receive Communion, approach the priest or deacon, receive the Host in your hand, raise or lower your mask, and place the Host on your tongue. Immediately replace your mask over your mouth.
12. Hosts can no longer be placed directly on a parishioner's tongue by a priest, deacon, or Eucharistic Minister. You must receive the Host in your hand and place it on your tongue. There is no receiving from the Cup.
13. The candles in the Gathering Area have been turned off and they are taped.
14. There are no printed bulletins. Bulletins are posted online on the parish website.
15. The Worship books have been removed from church. You may bring your own booklet, iPad or iPhone to use during Mass.
16. You will also notice that everything that can be touched has been removed from the church. There is no Holy Water.
17. Once Mass is over, please quickly exit the church so that the pews can be sanitized for the next Mass.
18. If you want to socialize with others whom you may not have seen in a while, please do so outside of church and not in the Gathering Area.

If you have any questions or are unsure of what to do while in church, please ask an usher. I ask your patience as we attempt to navigate through all of this. We realize this is a very different situation for all of us. It can work if we work together. If you have any questions or concerns, please do not hesitate to let me know.

Gospel Reflection:

To see the Lord Jesus is to recognize and know the true nature of God and his personal love for us. In Jesus we see the perfect love of God - a God who cares intensely and who yearns over every man and woman whom he has created in his image and likeness (Genesis 1:26-27). God the Father loved us even while we were lost in ignorance and blinded by sin and pride. He sent us his Only Begotten Son, the Lord Jesus Christ, who freely gave up his life for us on the cross as the atoning sacrifice for our sins (John 3:16, 1 John 2:2, 1 John 1:7). Paul the Apostle tells us that Jesus is the image of God (Colossians 1:15). He is the perfect revelation of God - a God who loves us totally, unconditionally, and without reservation. What can separate us from the love of God? Only our own stubborn pride, willfulness, and rebellious attitude towards God and his will for our lives.

"Lord Jesus, give me the child-like simplicity and purity of faith to gaze upon your face with joy and confidence in your all-merciful love. Remove every doubt, fear, and proud thought which would hinder me from receiving your word with trust and humble submission."

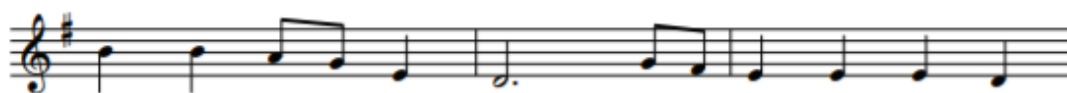

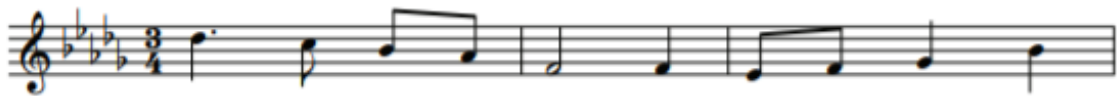

Saint of the Week.....

Memorial of Saint Benedict, Abbot ~ Saturday, July 11th

Born in Norcia about 480, Benedict's first studies were in Rome but, disappointed with city life, he retired to Subiaco, where he stayed for about three years in a cave—the famous *sacro speco*—dedicating himself wholly to God. In Subiaco, making use of the ruins of a cyclopean villa of the emperor Nero, he built some monasteries, together with his first disciples, giving life to a fraternal community founded on the primacy of the love of Christ, in which prayer and work were alternated harmoniously in praise of God.

Years later, he completed this project in Monte Cassino, and put it in writing in his Rule, the only work of his that has come down to us. Amid the ashes of the Roman Empire, Benedict, seeking first of all the kingdom of God, sowed, perhaps even without realizing it, the seed of a new civilization which would develop, integrating Christian values with classical heritage, on one hand, and the Germanic and Slav cultures on the other.

There is a particular aspect of his spirituality, which today I would particularly like to underline. Benedict did not found a monastic institution oriented primarily to the evangelization of barbarian peoples, as other great missionary monks of the time, but indicated to his followers that the fundamental, and even more, the sole objective of existence is the search for God: "Quaerere Deum."

He knew, however, that when the believer enters into a profound relationship with God he cannot be content with living in a mediocre way, with a minimalist ethic and superficial religiosity. In this light, one understands better the expression that Benedict took from St. Cyprian and that is summarized in his *Rule* (IV, 21)—the monks' program of life: *Nihil amori Christi praeponere. Prefer nothing to the love of Christ.*

Holiness consists in this valid proposal for every Christian that has become a true pastoral imperative in our time, in which one perceives the need to anchor life and history in solid spiritual references.

It was so nice to see some of our families at mass this past weekend. Please remember, if you are attending Mass in person, please adhere to the guidelines found on page 3 of this bulletin.

For those not feeling comfortable returning to church to attend mass, we will continue to offer our virtual 10:30AM Sunday Mass.

This week Governor Murphy announced the guidelines for the reopening of public schools in September. Once the Springfield Superintendent announces the guidelines for our public school district we will better be able to plan for our classes.

I will be sending out a short survey next week to the families who are already registered for September classes. Please take a moment to fill it out (it will be online!). Your feedback is an important part of our planning for our reopening. Any parent wishing to discuss their thoughts in detail is encouraged to give me a call. You might have an idea that we haven't thought of!

Do you have a school aged child who has been baptized but has not received religious education or been prepared for the sacraments? Do you, or someone you know, have a special needs child in need of sacramental preparation? Please call the Religious Education office. We are here to help; I encourage all families, but especially those with children preparing for the Sacrament of First Eucharist, to continue attending our virtual Sunday morning mass on either YouTube or Facebook at 10:30AM. This is a great opportunity to answer your child's questions during the actual mass without worrying about disturbing anyone sitting around you. Participating in virtual mass will also reinforce the prayers that we recite and help the children to acclimate themselves when we are reunited in church again. Please plan on joining us as we pray the Rosary every Monday evening at 7:00PM on Facebook or Zoom.

As we continue to discover new ways of sharing our faith, we also need to find new ways to catechize our children. If you have ideas or suggestions, I encourage you to contact me.

Any family new to our program or with a child entering 1st grade (Kindergarten is optional) please email me so we can arrange to speak. Baptismal certificates are required for all new students regardless of grade at the time of registration.

Pat Sullivan and Nancy Caputo thank you for your past support of Family Promise. As many of you know, our hosting weeks for Family Promise this summer would have taken place Sunday, June 28 through Sunday morning, July 5th.

With the cooperation of the local community, at the outbreak of the pandemic, the families were placed in temporary housing for the summer. While we are not physically hosting the families we are virtually supporting them by providing meals, gift cards and summer fun items for the children.

We especially need Gift Cards. Frozen pre-packaged meals are also still needed. If you are interested in providing a frozen dinner (for a family of 4) please let us know. You do not need to cook & freeze (unless you want to!). Each meal should consist of prepackaged/frozen meat; vegetables, condiments and dessert. Fresh (prepackaged) salad, fresh fruit and vegetables are also welcomed treats.

Dinner suggestions: hotdogs & beans; frozen hamburgers / rolls, Perdue chicken, frozen pasta, pre-seasoned/packaged BBQ wings, ribs; frozen pizzas & fresh veggies, dinner rolls, frozen yogurt bars, and don't forget we would also provide lunch..... bread, luncheon meats, peanut butter & jelly, tuna / chicken.

Some of the families have young children, so sidewalk chalk, bouncing balls, water soakers, etc. could add some additional fun for the family.

If you are unable to shop for groceries, then consider donating a gift card. Some of the suggestions:

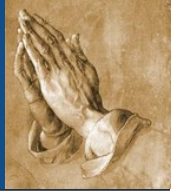

INTENTIONS FOR THE SICK

At the *General Intercessions* we pray for the sick. Our prayers for the sick are very important, especially in critical times of sudden illness, surgery or worsening condition. We will continue to pray for and mention the names of the sick. When the condition improves, please call the Rectory so that the name can be removed from the list.

COMMUNION AT MASS

If you cannot walk up the aisle to receive Holy Communion and do not want to sit in the first pew, please let one of the ushers know and an Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion will come to you at the end of the procession and administer the Body & Blood to you.

RECEIVING COMMUNION

A reminder that during the Covid-19 restrictions, the Eucharist can only be received in the hands. It is good to remind ourselves of the reverence needed when we receive the Body and Blood of Christ.

When we approach the altar please remove any gloves beforehand.
Remember to bow slightly without being ostentatious and reply “Amen”.
If communion runs out, please wait in line for the Minister to return.

The ushers are available to assist you during the reception of Holy Communion and before / after Mass.
