SOLEMNITY OF THE MOST HOLY BODY AND BLOOD OF CHRIST

MESSAGE FROM THE PASTOR

Today is the **FEAST OF CORPUS CHRISTI, THE BODY & BLOOD OF CHRIST!** Today celebrates the gift of the Eucharist to us. This was the gift Jesus gave the apostles and all of us at the Last Supper. But the Eucharist is more than what we receive. It is who we are as God's people, the Body of Christ. As such, we are called to live in a right relationship with our God and with each other, building up the Body of Christ by the way we live our lives.

But the Body of Christ is hurting these days. This is not just from COVID-19, which has affected us all in one way or another. It is also hurting because of the death of George Floyd and the apparent underlying racism. But there is also the issue of the protests that resulted in looting, destruction, and fires. There is nothing wrong with protesting, but when it leads to all this destruction, something is wrong. It is easy to become filled with anger and rage over events, especially the loss of human life, but it should never lead to the disrespect of individuals or property, especially those people and businesses that support the community.

Yes, the Body of Christ is hurting. We must stand for something different, to show that as the Body of Christ we have a way to live as brother and sister in the Lord. We do not have to talk about it because the way we behave toward each other and the attitudes we have all reflect our faith in the God who calls us as his own. Jesus offered us a different way to encounter one another, in the hope that as he made a difference for us, we can do the same for one another. Violence and destruction do not change the world but caring for and loving one another do. This is not as difficult as it seems.

The readings today remind us that we are one because we share the one bread and the one cup in the Lord. The Eucharist nurtures us, sustains us, satisfies our hunger, and quenches our thirst. The Lord sends us forth to be his Body for each other, so that we can return and be nourished over and over. When we can gather again as a community, we will be able to experience this from another perspective. Until then, let us not lose our perspective on the seriousness of the Lord's call to goodness, holiness, and unity. These are critical issues for all of us, and they will help in healing the suffering Body of Christ. If each of us can bring a little bit of light, life, and love to the people we meet, even in these difficult days, then that will go a long way in helping others experience the gift that Jesus is to all of us. We are the Body of Christ!

Gospel Reflection: When we receive from the Lord's table we unite ourselves to Jesus Christ, who makes us sharers in his body and blood and partakers of his divine life. Ignatius of Antioch (35-107 A.D.) calls it the "one bread that provides the medicine of immortality, the antidote for death, and the food that makes us live forever in Jesus Christ" (Ad Eph. 20,2). This supernatural food is healing for both body and soul and strength for our journey heavenward.

When you approach the Table of the Lord, what do you expect to receive? Healing, pardon, comfort, and rest for your soul? The Lord has much more for us, more than we can ask or imagine. The principal fruit of receiving the Eucharist or Lord's Supper is an intimate union with Christ. As bodily nourishment restores lost strength, so the Eucharist strengthens us in charity and enables us to break with disordered attachments to creatures and to be more firmly rooted in the love of Christ. Do you hunger for the "bread of life"?

"Lord Jesus, you nourish and sustain us with your very own presence and life-giving word. You are the bread of life - the heavenly food that sustains us now and that produces everlasting life within us. May I always hunger for you and be satisfied in you alone."

As we continue to discover new ways of sharing our faith, we also need to find new ways to catechize our children. If you have ideas or suggestions, I encourage you to contact me..



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

Statement of Cardinal Joseph W. Tobin, C.Ss.R.

Archbishop of Newark

The people of the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Newark join with Catholic dioceses across the United States as well as all people of good will in condemning the senseless and brutal murder of George Floyd in Minneapolis on May 25. We extend our deep sorrow to his family and friends, who face soul-sapping grief because of his terrible death.

We offer heartfelt prayer for the people of Minneapolis and St. Paul, expressing special solidarity with our beloved brother, Archbishop Bernard Hebda and the people he serves.

The murder of George Floyd, which is simply the latest instance of a person of color dying at the hands of those sworn to protect the community, has provoked justified anger and peaceful protest across the United States. Rage, as well as shameful exploitation of this tragedy, have spawned inexcusable violence in cities throughout this nation. As we witness the asphyxiation of our country, many of us cry in anguish: **why?**

How we answer the question is crucial because we will then know what to pray for and how we must act. No one comes to Jesus with the lame request of wanting to feel better. They name the evil and ask for relief. We need to turn to the Lord of the Universe, for the malice we name cannot be eradicated by our unaided efforts.

The necessity of naming the evil of racism humiliates us, since so many events in our lifetime, let alone the history of our nation, have compelled us to shamefully recognize the national sin that obliges African Americans to endure unique and relentless humiliation, indignity, and unequal opportunity. Our tolerance of racism as well as collective deafness to the cry of those so grievously offended and the conscious and unconscionable promotion of divisions in this nation has encouraged the heinous evil of racism to propagate.

Certainly, tolerance of tribalistic factions in the United States, especially in our political forum, promotes a savage law of the jungle and an immoral ethos of "might makes right". Violent rhetoric, selfishness and even the crude appropriation of religious symbols conspire to produce a malevolent miasma in which the sin of racism may flourish unchecked. Our society will make no progress in addressing the evil of racism without the will to leave behind the purveyors of polarization.

The Archdiocese of Newark must renew our commitment to making the dream of peace built on justice and racial equality a reality for all our sisters and brothers, here in northern New Jersey as well as throughout the United States. Since this is our goal, we embrace gratefully the prophetic words of the Reverend Martin Luther King, Jr., "Darkness cannot drive out darkness; only light can do that. Hate cannot drive out hate; only love can do that."

In great sorrow, but also with profound hope, we turn to the Blessed Virgin Mary, Mother of the Church, and ask for her protection and care during these troubled times. This young woman sang of One whose mercy is from age to age to those who fear him...who has shown might with his arm, dispersed the arrogant of mind and heart...who has thrown down the rulers from their thrones, but lifted up the lowly (Luke 1, 50-52). May she inspire us with courage to do the work of justice and to eliminate—once and for all—all hatred, bigotry and violence from our hearts, our homes and our communities.

Truth About Plastic Bottles of Water

While preparing for this period of caution and taking good care of ourselves and families, have you noticed all those empty shelves where bottled water sat? People think bottled water is a good way to drink water, but is it really better than using what comes from the tap at home? What is the truth about tap water and bottled water?

Unfortunately, our tap water exposes us to things like microbes, pesticides, plastics, prescription medications, metals, and chlorine. All of these contaminates add up and cause serious health challenges.

Plastic water bottles may seem like a better choice, but in fact, they are sometimes worse. They contain particles of things like Bisphenol A (BPA), an industrial chemical which has been linked to reproductive challenges, obesity, heart disease, and breast cancer. And get this: the environmental group, National Resources Defense Council (NRDC), estimates that 25% of all bottled water is just tap water!

So what can we do to get the best quality water? A good option is to investigate installing a good water filter either in your house or on your kitchen faucet. If this is not possible, purchase a filtered water pitcher like a Britta. This can be a little overwhelming when you are searching for the best to buy. There is a large range you can chose from, starting with a pitcher filter down to a 4-stage filtration system that removes 20 times more contaminants than other water filters. To help make your choice, research reliable consumer report websites.

Buying water bottles over time adds up, so maybe it makes more sense to put that money into a system that allows you to access clean drinking water from your home. Remember: water is a foundation of good health!

REPORTING ABUSE: AN UPDATE

Since 2002, the Archdiocese of Newark has formalized a process of reporting sexual abuse allegations, in accordance with the USCCB *Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, Essential Norms* and a Memorandum of Understanding between the state prosecutors' offices and the NJ Dioceses. A year ago, Pope Francis issued an apostolic letter, *Vos estis lux mundi*, (*You are the light of the world*) that strengthened and formalized the process for holding bishops accountable. As part of the implementation of the letter here in the United States, a platform was created by an independent, third party providing a secure, confidential, and professional way to report allegations against living bishops. This service is in place to gather and relay reports of sexual misconduct involving bishops of the United States, and reports of their intentional interference in a sexual abuse investigation. Individuals may make a report online at <u>www.ReportBishopAbuse.org</u> or by calling toll free (800) 276-1562. If you wish to report any other kind of misconduct by a bishop—or sexual abuse by a priest, deacon, religious brother or sister, or layperson working for the Church—please contact the Archdiocese of Newark at (201) 407-3256.

Eight-year-old Abby never expected she'd be doing her homework in a motel room every night. But when her dad lost his job, her family had to give up their home. They moved into a motel, and Abby went from having her own bedroom to sharing one room with her entire family. It was hard for her to focus on school or imagine a happy future.

Abby's not alone. *One in 16 children in the U.S. experiences homelessness by the first grade.* They and their families can be found sleeping in motel rooms, with friends, or even in their cars. And kids who face home-lessness suffer in other ways, as well. They're more likely to drop out of school, repeat a grade, suffer from depression, and attempt suicide.

You can show your support for children and families battling homelessness and raise awareness of this crisis by joining Family Promise's first national Night Without A Bed sleep-out on Saturday, June 20, 2020.

Put up a tent in your back yard. Make a fort in your living room. Wrap up in blankets on the sofa or in a sleeping bag on the floor. Give up your comfortable bed for one night and share the experience with friends and family. Post photos of your Night Without A Bed on social media using **#NightWithoutABed**, tag Family Promise, and ask sponsors to support your efforts to help families battling homelessness.

For more than 30 years, Family Promise has been helping families in need find stable housing and develop the skills and tools to succeed independently – families just like Abby's.

Thanks to Family Promise, Abby's parents found employment, the family moved into housing, and Abby's life began returning to normal.

A TIME OF WAR & PEACE
