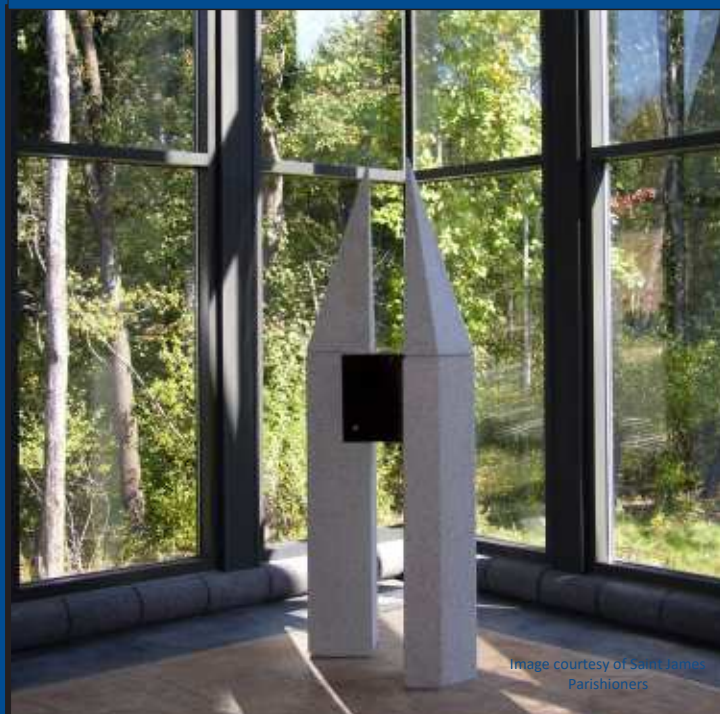

June 21, 2020

MESSAGE FROM THE PASTOR

We begin the Sundays of Ordinary Time today. We continue with the Gospel of Matthew, which is Cycle A of the Sunday readings.

As we continue through the pandemic, and as things start to loosen and re-open, we have to continue to follow the directives we have been given to remain safe. While the directives may be annoying, especially because we can't wait to do what we normally do, we have to use common sense so we protect ourselves and each other as much as possible. The same is true with the opening of the churches. While many of us are eager to come back to church to worship publicly, we also have to be aware of how the church has been configured for social distancing. We began daily mass this past week, and once the number of people allowed inside increases from 50, we are hoping that we can open for Sunday Mass. Otherwise, it will be difficult to determine who will be allowed to attend Mass.

In today's Gospel, Jesus is reminding us of how important we are to God, so much so that he gave us his Son to live, die and rise for us. Sometimes though, we may think that we are not worth God's love. God's love is not something we can earn; it is freely given by the Father through the Son. As a result of this, we are a visible sign of the presence of Jesus, and so we are to treat each other with the same love and respect that he shows for us. Jesus always challenges us to reflect his presence and love in who we are and how we relate to each other. This is how the kingdom of God is built on earth.

We have seen a lot of negativity during this pandemic. This tends to make us wonder if all our efforts are worth it. They are because we are called to stand for something different. We have to stand as a sign of hope for the present, and while we cannot solve the problems in our society, we can offer one another a glimpse of the love of God for us, revealed in Christ Jesus. It is not so much what we say as much as what we do. Our actions have to be consistent with our faith in God or else they are empty. When we maintain that unique relationship of Father and Son, then we begin to radiate that presence in how we think, and what we say and do. This is not complicated, but sometimes we make it so because we can't seem to make the connection between the relationships we touch in prayer and the way we live.

Gospel Reflection:

When Jesus proclaimed the kingdom of God he met opposition and hostility from those who refused to believe in him. He tells his disciples that they must expect the same treatment if they are to live and to proclaim the reign of God. There is both a warning and a privilege in his statement. Just as Jesus had to carry his cross, so the disciples must carry their cross and not try to evade it. To suffer for the faith is to share in the work of Christ. As one hymn states: *Lift high the Cross of Christ! Tread where his feet have trod.* The Holy Spirit gives us power and grace to live as disciples of Jesus Christ. Do you trust in God’s grace to carry your cross for Jesus’ sake?

"Lord Jesus, it is my joy and privilege to be your disciple. Give me strength and courage to bear any hardship and suffering which may come my way in your service. May I witness to others the new life, joy and victory you have won for us through your cross and resurrection."

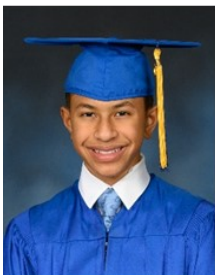

Truth About Plastic Bottles of Water

While preparing for this period of caution and taking good care of ourselves and families, have you noticed all those empty shelves where bottled water sat? People think bottled water is a good way to drink water, but is it really better than using what comes from the tap at home? What is the truth about tap water and bottled water?

Unfortunately, our tap water exposes us to things like microbes, pesticides, plastics, prescription medications, metals, and chlorine. All of these contaminants add up and cause serious health challenges.

Plastic water bottles may seem like a better choice, but in fact, they are sometimes worse. They contain particles of things like Bisphenol A (BPA), an industrial chemical which has been linked to reproductive challenges, obesity, heart disease, and breast cancer. And get this: the environmental group, National Resources Defense Council (NRDC), estimates that 25% of all bottled water is just tap water!

So what can we do to get the best quality water? A good option is to investigate installing a good water filter either in your house or on your kitchen faucet. If this is not possible, purchase a filtered water pitcher like a Britta. This can be a little overwhelming when you are searching for the best to buy. There is a large range you can choose from, starting with a pitcher filter down to a 4-stage filtration system that removes 20 times more contaminants than other water filters. To help make your choice, research reliable consumer report websites.

Buying water bottles over time adds up, so maybe it makes more sense to put that money into a system that allows you to access clean drinking water from your home. Remember: water is a foundation of good health!
