MESSAGE FROM THE PASTOR

We began Sunday liturgies last week, and all went well. Some folks who had not been in the church previously were surprised to see how the church was configured. I spoke to the congregation before each Mass, except the 12:00 Noon Mass because there were few parishioners there, and I asked everyone to leave the church and socialize outside, so the church could be sanitized. We must do this after each mass. I am very grateful that everyone was very cooperative, which I expected. We all know these are different times, and we must follow the directives given to us.

In today's Gospel, Jesus is reminding us that our primary focus should be our relationship with God, as expressed in the love that Jesus has for us. This does not mean that we must give up everyone in our lives and everything we do, but that they should be kept in perspective. In other words, we cannot be so consumed by our relationships or our work and activities that they prevent us from living as a faithful follower of the Lord. Most of us are pretty good at living as a faithful follower. However, sometimes we forget that we are the visible sign of Jesus for each other.

During this pandemic, it is very easy to give up and isolate ourselves from each other and God. Yet, we can offer each other, the church, and society something that is different, and that is the presence of Jesus within and among us. It is easy to become frustrated because our world has changed, our children have been at home trying to learn, and we wonder what will happen next. If we maintain our integrity, our balance, and use common sense, then we should be okay. We still have lives to live, families to support, work that must get done, and children to be cared for. We are aware of the stresses facing many of you because of the pandemic, and it is my hope that you will reach out to those of us who can help you. Whatever we do here at Saint James is done with your care and concern in mind. We try to cover all bases, so that your needs and care are paramount for us. There is no question that this is the most difficult situation that we have ever experienced. Every happy event has taken on a new dimension that we never thought possible.

Saturday is July 4, our Independence Day. Even this has taken on a new dimension. But never let us forget that this day celebrates our freedom from England, and our formation as a new nation. Is it perfect? As the events of the last few weeks have shown, it is not. But this all reminds us that we are a work in progress, as we continue to help make this nation a place of freedom for all, regardless of ethnic heritage, skin color, language spoken, sexual orientation, or religious beliefs. Obviously, we need to improve so that all feel welcome and accepted in America. We can help in the way we accept each other as brother and sister as we attempt to bring the Kingdom of God closer to each other. It's all about what we can do and be for one another as brothers and sisters to each other and to Jesus.

Gospel Reflection:

God has no equal - that is why we owe the eternal Father, Son, and Holy Spirit our undivided loyalty, trust, and obedience. Jesus challenges his disciples to examine who they love first and foremost. A true disciple loves God above all else and is willing to forsake all for the Lord Jesus who calls us to follow him. Jesus insists that his disciples give him the loyalty which is due to God, a loyalty which is higher than spouse or kin. It is possible that family and friends can become our enemies, if the thought of them keeps us from doing what we know God wants us to do.

Who or what takes first place in your life - in your daily thoughts, cares, and concerns? God has put us first in his thought, care, and concern for our well-being and future. God loved us first and our love for him is a response to his exceeding kindness and mercy towards us. Even while we were hopelessly adrift through our own sinful pride, rebellion and unbelief, he choose to give us his own beloved Son, the Lord Jesus Christ, who laid down his life for our sake - to set us free from slavery to sin, Satan, and death.

"Lord, no eye has seen, no ear has heard, no heart has conceived the things you have prepared for those who love you. Set us ablaze with the fire of the Holy Spirit, that we may love you in and above all things and so receive the rewards you have promised us through Christ our Lord."

With the cooperation of the local community, at the outbreak of the pandemic, the families were placed in temporary housing for the summer. While we are not physically hosting the families we are virtually supporting them by providing meals, gift cards and summer fun items for the children.

If you are interested in providing a frozen dinner (for a family of 4) please let us know. You do not need to cook & freeze (unless you want to!). Each meal should consist of prepackaged/frozen meat; vegetables, condiments and dessert. Fresh (prepackaged) salad, fresh fruit and vegetables are also welcomed treats.

Dinner suggestions: hotdogs & beans; frozen hamburgers / rolls, Perdue chicken, frozen pasta, pre-seasoned/ packaged BBQ wings, ribs; frozen pizzas & fresh veggies, dinner rolls, frozen yogurt bars, and don't forget we would also provide lunch..... bread, luncheon meats, peanut butter & jelly, tuna / chicken.

Some of the families have young children so, sidewalk chalk, bouncing balls, water soakers, etc. could add some additional fun for the family.

If you are unable to shop for groceries, then consider donating a gift card. Some of the suggestions:

INTENTIONS FOR THE SICK
