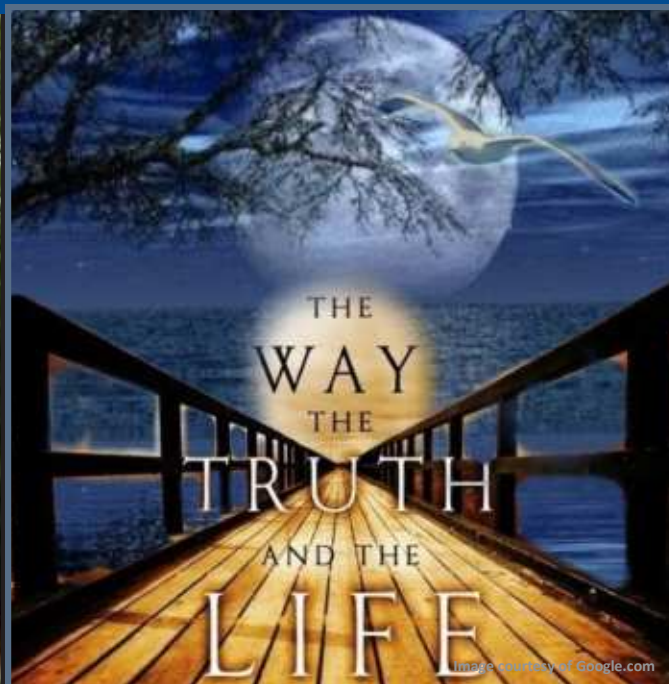

Fifth Sunday of Easter ~ May 10, 2020

MESSAGE FROM THE PASTOR

**"THE LORD INTO HIS GARDENS COME, THE SPICES YIELD A RICH PERFUME,

As we begin this Fifth Week of Easter, we are reminded by the Lord that he is the way to the Father, he is the truth of the Father's love, and he is the life made real for us. This is not just what we believe, it is also a reassurance during this time of Covid-19. We need assurance that all is well, despite the different and difficult situation we are experiencing. There has to be someone who offers us something different, a ray of hope at a time like this. It is Jesus who stands with us, reminding us that he is present in and through us. He invites us to reflect that presence in who we are and how we interact with one another.

While this Easter Season has been most unusual for all of us, it is still a time of Mystagogy, a time to reflect more deeply on the resurrection and its impact and effect in our lives. We are still sent to others as reminders of the new life and hope that Jesus gained for us and which is engendered in each of us. Today's Gospel and the Gospels for the next two Sundays are part of what is called the Priestly Prayer of Jesus. They take place at the Last Supper and they portray Jesus praying over his apostles before he dies. They are similar to his last will and testament for the apostles, because as he leaves them, they will have to continue his work. And so, he reassures them that he will be with them for all days, as he is with us.

While it is unusual for us to wear masks in public and to social distance from each other, this may become the new normal for us. There is always the concern that large groups will congregate together, thus creating more problems for us all. At this point, I am not sure what will happen with Masses on the weekend, but we will have to take it one week at a time. Our plan is to live-stream the Mass each Sunday through the month of May. This way we will all be safe. We, the Parish Staff, will continue to discuss how best to serve all of you when everything reopens. I will keep you abreast of all of that. Even our worship may look different, not so much what we do, but how we are configured in church.

All of the Mass intentions from March 15 through the month of May of this year have been re-scheduled through 2020 and into March of next year. If you have scheduled a mass during this time and want to know the date it has been re-scheduled, please call the rectory and we will gladly tell you.

FIRST READING: ACTS 6:1-7

As the number of disciples continued to grow, the Hellenists complained against the Hebrews because their widows were being neglected in the daily distribution. So the Twelve called together the community of the disciples and said, "It is not right for us to neglect the word of God to serve at table. Brothers, select from among you seven reputable men, filled with the Spirit and wisdom, whom we shall appoint to this task, whereas we shall devote ourselves to prayer and to the ministry of the word." The proposal was acceptable to the whole community, so they chose Stephen, a man filled with faith and the

Holy Spirit, also Philip, Prochorus, Nicanor, Timon, Parmenas, and Nicholas of Antioch, a convert to Judaism. They presented these men to the apostles who prayed and laid hands on them. The word of God continued to spread, and the number of the disciples in Jerusalem increased greatly; even a large group of priests were becoming obedient to the faith.

SECOND READING: PT 2:4-9

Beloved:
Come to him, a living stone, rejected by human beings but chosen and precious in the sight of God, and, like living stones, let yourselves be built into a spiritual house to be a holy priesthood to offer spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ. For it says in Scripture:
Behold, I am laying a stone in Zion, a cornerstone, chosen and precious, and whoever believes in it shall not be put to shame.

Therefore, its value is for you who have faith, but for those without faith:
The stone that the builders rejected has become the cornerstone, and A stone that will make people stumble, and a rock that will make them fall.
They stumble by disobeying the word, as is their destiny.

You are "a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people of his own, so that you may announce the praises" of him who called you out of darkness into his wonderful light.

Praying Together Unites Us As One

GOSPEL: JOHN 14:1-12

Jesus said to his disciples:

“Do not let your hearts be troubled.

You have faith in God; have faith also in me.

In my Father’s house there are many dwelling places.

If there were not,

would I have told you that I am going to prepare a place for you?

And if I go and prepare a place for you,

I will come back again and take you to myself,

so that where I am you also may be.

Where I am going you know the way.”

Thomas said to him,

“Master, we do not know where you are going;

how can we know the way?”

Jesus said to him, "I am the way and the truth and the life.

No one comes to the Father except through me.

If you know me, then you will also know my Father.

From now on you do know him and have seen him.”

Philip said to him,

“Master, show us the Father, and that will be enough for us.”

Jesus said to him, “Have I been with you for so long a time

and you still do not know me, Philip?

Whoever has seen me has seen the Father.

How can you say, ‘Show us the Father’?

Do you not believe that I am in the Father and the Father is in me?

The words that I speak to you I do not speak on my own.

The Father who dwells in me is doing his works.

Believe me that I am in the Father and the Father is in me,

or else, believe because of the works themselves.

Amen, amen, I say to you,

whoever believes in me will do the works that I do,

and will do greater ones than these,

because I am going to the Father.”

Gospel Reflection: Do you allow any troubles to rob you of God's gift of peace? As much as we try to avoid it, we inevitably encounter challenges and trials that can shake our confidence and our trust in God. Jesus knew that his disciples would be put to the test when their Master was taken from them during his suffering and passion - his arrest, trial, and rejection by the leaders of his own people, and crucifixion by the Romans. Jesus encouraged his disciples to put their faith and hope in God the Father and also in himself.

When adversity or trouble comes your way, does it make you lose hope or give into fear and despair, or does it press you closer to the Lord Jesus and to the strength and help he offers you? When the people of Israel became discouraged and grew weary during their 40 years in the wilderness, the Lord assured them that he would personally bring them safely into the promised land.

"It is the Lord who goes before you; he will be with you, he will not fail you or forsake you; do not fear or be dismayed" (Deuteronomy 31:8).

Cardinal Joseph W. Tobin's Homily for the Reconsecration of Our Country to Mary, Mother of the Church Friday, May 1, 2020 (source: rcan.org)

My dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Today the Archdiocese of Newark joins the Catholic Church across the United States and Canada in renewing the consecration of our nations to Our Lady under the title of Mary, Mother of the Church. Our prayer is an expression of communion with the dioceses of the United States and unites us in solidarity with our Holy Father, Pope Francis, who never tires of invoking the Blessed Virgin Mary as Mother of the Church, a source of protection and strength.

An act of consecration is meant to be a reminder to all of us of the Blessed Mother's witness to the Gospel and to ask for her intercession before her Son on behalf of those in need. The Word of God we just heard tells us why we can make this new act of consecration with humble confidence.

Lifted high on the Cross, Jesus speaks to the woman who was the first disciple to commit herself unconditionally to his Word. He commands her to **see** the Beloved Disciple and **accept** him as her son. He then turns to the Beloved Disciple – the same one who had rested his head on the chest of Jesus during the Last Supper – and commands him to **see** the mother of Jesus and to **accept** her as his mother. The Gospel tells us that Jesus' commands were unquestionably obeyed: *from that hour the disciple took her into his home.*

The Gospel invites us to see more than a dying Jesus providing for his widowed mother. A new family is created at the foot of the Cross, a family that numbers more than two people, Mary and the Beloved Disciple. Jesus prophesied that *when I am lifted up from the earth, I will draw everyone to myself* into a new family, a new creation. Lifted high on the Cross, Jesus *bows his head and hands over the spirit* to that family. From his pierced side flows *water and blood*, the sacraments which will provide life for the new family. And, in that new family, the motherly role of Mary is unquestionably established. Jesus says to each of us: *Behold your Mother!*

Do you suppose that the Mother of Jesus, who stood close to his Cross, was not present by the beds of our relatives, friends, priests and Sisters, who suffered and died in this pandemic? Do you suppose that Mary, who interceded for the newly-weds in Cana of Galilee, will not implore her Son to restore our joy? Do you suppose that the Mother of the Lord will not lead us to the source of all life and happiness and not remind us to “do whatever he tells you?”

Let us renew our consecration to Mary, Mother of the Church and welcome her into our home.

I encourage all families, but especially those with children preparing for the Sacrament of First Eucharist, to join our virtual Sunday morning mass on either YouTube or Facebook at 10:30AM. This is a great opportunity to answer your child's questions during the actual mass without worrying about disturbing anyone sitting around you. Participating in a virtual mass will also reinforce the prayers that we recite together. Please have your child follow along in their **"Going to Mass"** booklet.

Every Monday evening we recite the Rosary at 7:00PM on our Facebook page. If your family has never said the Rosary together, why not start now from the privacy of your own home? The only thing you need is a set of Rosary Beads (or use your fingers!) because the prayers are all posted on the screen for us to recite together.

As we discover new ways of sharing our faith, we are also working with the Archdiocese to talk about different ways to continue to catechize our children. These are definitely challenging times not only to share our faith but for preparing our children to receive the Sacraments of First Eucharist and Confirmation. Unfortunately, until we are able to gather again within the church building, these sacraments will remain on hold. When I receive new directives from the Archdiocese I will surely let our sacramental families know! Until then, we are moving ahead planning for the 2020-2021 school year.

The Family Faith Program description along with the link to the **online** Family Registration was emailed to all currently registered, returning families. Unfortunately, we are unable to accept credit cards or online payments so payments will need to be mailed into the Religious Education Office, at the address above.

Any family new to our program or with a child entering 1st grade (Kindergarten is optional) please email me so we can arrange to speak. Baptismal certificates are required for all new students regardless of grade at the time of registration.

The Religious Education Staff has resumed limited office hours but is always available by email if you have any questions or concerns. Please continue to maintain social distancing and stay home whenever possible.

Under the direction of SASS, a team of 16 Saint James parishioners has been busy cutting fabric and sewing masks to be distributed to New Jersey hospitals, including Overlook, as well as several Union County police departments. At this time, we announce the following changes to our cemetery visitation policies:

- **On Mother's Day, Sunday, May 10**, all archdiocesan cemeteries will be open for visitation from 8:00AM to 5:00PM and will be open for visitation every Sunday, thereafter.
- **Beginning on Monday, May 11**, up to 10 family members will be permitted to attend a burial service. (currently, two family members only are permitted.)
- Until further notice, all committal services are limited to immediate family only and not to exceed the recommendations of New Jersey Executive Order No. 107 (2020) and Administrative Order 2020-04, that gatherings of 10 persons or fewer are permitted.
- **Beginning on Monday, May 18**, cemetery visitation will be permitted weekdays, Monday through Saturday, from 3:00PM to 6:00PM, after all interments are completed.

Sentinel Management has notified Catholic Charities that our Donation Bins are anticipated to be open as of **Monday, May 18th**. We are grateful for your patience and look forward to your continued support.

We need clothing, small appliances, shoes, linens, sheets, towels, stuffed animals, novels, toys, knickknacks, and children's books.

We pray for an end of this virus in our society and throughout the world.
