MESSAGE FROM THE PASTOR

During the past week or so there has been a lot of discussion and reaction to the fact that President Trump and his wife tested positive for COVID-19. Reaction to his diagnosis has come from across the country and around the world. The president has underlying conditions that make him more susceptible to the virus, but he didn't help himself by not wearing a mask, not social distancing from others, and gathering with large groups of people who also were not wearing masks. This only shows how serious this virus is, and it will become more so as we begin to move our activities indoors as the weather gets colder. It is important that we wear our masks, maintain social distancing, and wash our hands regularly.

We have noticed that couples who are getting married during the pandemic are delaying their receptions because of the restrictions in the number of people allowed indoors. Most couples are having ceremonies now and holding their receptions next year. This is all very different from what we are used to doing. In today's Gospel, the king holds a wedding reception for his son, only all those invited make excuses as to why they can't attend. So, he sends his servants to invite anyone they encounter on the way. Pretty soon, the banquet hall is filled with people looking for a good meal, except for one person who wasn't dressed properly.

Jesus invites us all to the Table of the Lord. Most of us accept his invitation, while some reject it for one reason or another. There are no restrictions to the invitation. Jesus reminds us to "come and see, come and hear, come and celebrate" the gift he is for us. Jesus doesn't discriminate against anyone, so anyone and everyone is invited. We are welcomed at the Table to break bread together, to listen to the Word and to celebrate our fellowship with each other and the intimate relationship of Father and Son. This relationship is life-giving and nurtures us on our journey of life. This relationship then becomes reflected in the way we live our lives in relationship to our God and with each other. The invitation is always given, the response is always ours.

Last Saturday, October 3, there was a Mass in Italian to celebrate the Feast of St. Francis of Assisi. In honor of St. Francis, \$75 was given to the church. Following the Mass, the traditional blessing of animals occurred in the front of the church. It was a good reminder for us of the entire gift of Francis, the first ecologist, to us!

MESSAGE FROM FR. JOE Regarding Attending Mass during Covid-19

Dear Fellow Saint James Parishioners:

It is great to be back together in church for Mass, but things are a little different. Please don't forget to call the parish office or email me (jbarbone@msn.com) by noon on Saturdays to let us know which Mass you plan to attend. Senior citizens and those with underlying medical conditions are encouraged to remain at home and watch the Sunday online 10:30AM Mass, which we will continue to live-stream.

If you do come to church for Mass, please remember the following:

- 1. You must wear a mask to enter the church and you must keep your mask on at all times while in the church, including during Mass.
- 2. As you go from the Gathering Area into the church, please use the appropriate door to enter and exit the church.
- 3. Please observe the one-way aisles, which are marked with blue tape on the floor.
- 4. You must maintain social distancing while in the church.
- 5. Half of the pews have been taped off to maintain social distancing. There are pieces of blue tape on each pew where you can sit. They are also on the floor by the back walls for those who prefer to stand. This area is also marked for social distancing.
- 6. Family members can sit together, but everyone else must sit 6 feet apart.
- 7. The weekly collection baskets will not be passed from parishioner to parishioner. They will be on the baptismal font. Please drop in your donation as you enter or exit the church.
- 8. There is no procession of the bread and wine ("bringing up the gifts").
- 9. Please do not shake hands when giving the sign of peace. Instead, wave, nod, or bow slightly.
- 10. There are three Communion stations: one in the center, one by the organ, and one by the ambo. The ushers will direct you to maintain social distance.
- 11. When it is your turn to receive Communion, approach the priest or deacon, receive the Host in your hand, raise or lower your mask, and place the Host on your tongue. Immediately replace your mask over your mouth.
- 12. Hosts can no longer be placed directly on a parishioner's tongue by a priest, deacon, or Eucharistic Minister. You must receive the Host in your hand and place it on your tongue. There is no receiving from the Cup.
- 13. The candles in the Gathering Area have been turned off and they are taped.
- 14. There are no printed bulletins. Bulletins are posted online on the parish website.
- 15. The Worship books have been removed from church. You may bring your own booklet, iPad or IPhone to use during Mass.
- 16. You will also notice that everything that can be touched has been removed from the church. There is no Holy Water.
- 17. Once Mass is over, please quickly exit the church so that the pews can be sanitized for the next Mass.
- 18. If you want to socialize with others whom you may not have seen in a while, please do so outside of church and not in the Gathering Area.

If you have any questions or are unsure of what to do while in church, please ask an usher. I ask your patience as we attempt to navigate through all of this. We realize this is a very different situation for all of us. It can work if we work together. If you have any questions or concerns, please do not hesitate to let me know.

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Gospel Reflection:

Matthew 22:1-14

Whose interests come first - God or mine?

Why does Jesus' parable of the marriage feast seem to focus on an angry king who ends up punishing those who refused his invitation and who mistreated his servants? Jesus' parable contains two stories. The first has to do with the original guests invited to the marriage feast. The king had sent out invitations well in advance to his subjects, so they would have plenty of time to prepare for coming to the feast. How insulting for the invited guests to then refuse when the time for celebrating came! They made light of the King's request because they put their own interests above his. They not only insulted the King but the heir to the throne as well. The king's anger is justified because they openly refused to give the king the honor he was due. Jesus directed this warning to the Jews of his day, both to convey how much God wanted them to share in the joy of his kingdom, but also to give a warning about the consequences of refusing his Son, their Messiah and Savior.

An invitation we cannot refuse!

The second part of the story focuses on those who had no claim on the king and who would never have considered getting such an invitation. The "good and the bad" along the highways certainly referred to the Gentiles (non-Jews) and to sinners. This is certainly an invitation of grace - undeserved, unmerited favor and kindness! But this invitation also contains a warning for those who refuse it or who approach the wedding feast unworthily. God's grace is a free gift, but it is also an awesome responsibility.

God invites each of us as his friends to his heavenly banquet that we may celebrate with him and share in his joy. *Are you ready to feast at the Lord's banquet table?*

Lord Jesus, may I always know the joy of living in your presence and grow in the hope of seeing you face to face in your everlasting kingdom.

Pope Francis's new encyclical, "Fratelli Tutti," ratifies a change in church teaching. In this case, on the death penalty.

In 2018, Pope Francis ordered a change in the Catechism of the Catholic Church, the official compendium of church teaching, when he termed the death penalty "inadmissible." Today the pope placed the full weight of his teaching authority behind this statement: The death penalty is inadmissible, and Catholics should work for its abolition. A papal encyclical is one of the highest of all documents in terms of its authority, removing any lingering doubt about the church's belief.

"There can be no stepping back from this position," says Francis, referring to the opposition to capital punishment expressed by St. John Paul II. "Today we state clearly that 'the death penalty is inadmissible' and the Church is firmly committed to calling for its abolition worldwide."...

With "Fratelli Tutti" Francis has moved opposition to the death penalty into the foreground of Catholic social teaching, completing the church's long journey of mercy and reconciliation.

SAINTS OF THE WEEK.....

Saint Teresa of Jesus (Ávila), Feast Day, October 15. Patron Saint of Spain, sick people, people in religious orders, people ridiculed for their piety, lace-makers, Požega, Croatia, Talisay City, Cebu, Philippines.

St. Teresa of Ávila was the founder of the Discalced Carmelites, which was a reform movement within the Carmelite Order. In her work of reform, she worked very closely with St. John of the Cross. She wrote several important works, including her autobiography, *Life of Teresa of Avila*, and her most influential work, *The Interior Castle*, in which she talks about the mystical life in terms of seven

mansions. These mansions show the growth in intimacy between the believer and God. St. Teresa was the first woman ever to be declared a Doctor of the Church (1970).

Saint Ignatius of Antioch, Feast Day, October 17. Patron Saint of the Church in Eastern Mediterranean; Church in North Africa.

Do you ever wonder who was the first person to call the community Jesus established the "Catholic Church"? It was Saint Ignatius of Antioch. It was his way of explaining that the Church was open to anyone who wanted to be a follower of Jesus.

Because Ignatius lived so long ago, we know very little about his early life. Tradition tells us that he was born around the year 50 and died sometime around the year 108. He was a disciple of Saint John the Evangelist, who was the Bishop of Antioch, in Syria. Ignatius succeeded him as bishop. Ignatius was like a shepherd, gently leading his people to understand the teachings of the Apostles and to put those beliefs into practice correctly.

In the year 107, the cruel Emperor Trajan demanded that Bishop Ignatius publicly speak out against our faith. Ignatius refused to deny his belief in Jesus Christ. Trajan sentenced him to die by being killed by lions in the Colosseum in Rome, far from Antioch. He wanted to make an example of this holy man.

Ten soldiers were assigned to guard him on the long trip. Bishop Ignatius used the time to write seven letters. The letters reminded the members of the Church to be faithful to the Lord and to follow the teachings of their bishop. They encourage the Christian community to serve the poor and needy—their brothers and sisters. Ignatius' letters have been preserved down through the ages. They still guide our Church today.

As Ignatius and his guards journeyed to Rome, they were met at different places by the local bishop and many members of the Christian community who came to honor him. It is said that he blessed everyone and told them he would pray for them.

Ignatius was not afraid to die. He said that his death would be his birth—into the new life made possible by Jesus' Resurrection: "I am writing to all the churches to let it be known that I will gladly die for God if only you do not stand in my way. I plead with you: show me no untimely kindness. Let me be food for the wild beasts, for they are my way to God."

The Church honors Ignatius of Antioch as a saint. We can pray to Saint Ignatius and ask him to help us grow in the faith that has been handed down to us from the Apostles.

A reminder that during the Covid-19 restrictions, the Eucharist can only be received in the hands. It is good to remind ourselves of the reverence needed when we receive the Body and Blood of Christ.

When we approach the altar please remove any gloves beforehand.

Remember to bow slightly without being ostentatious and reply "Amen".

If communion runs out, please wait in line for the Minister to return.

The ushers are available to assist you during the reception of Holy Communion and before / after Mass.
