# **MESSAGE FROM THE PASTOR**

Jesus was always faithful to the Father in whatever he did, including his suffering and death. Jesus reminds us that we need to be faithful to him and to the Gospel if we want to be considered credible witnesses and disciples. Sometimes, though, we may get distracted by our concerns and while not forgetting about being faithful, it skips our minds. Trying to keep our focus and our balance in a complicated, and sometimes difficult world is not always easy. This is the reason we need to keep coming back to the Lord so that we can maintain our focus on his call for fidelity to the mission. The mission is simply to bring the Good News of Jesus to others, so that we can help make the kingdom of God real for others.

Consider Mary as a model of fidelity to her Son. As difficult as it was for her to see Jesus suffer, she maintained her faith in him and all she was called to be as his mother, by the Father. Sometimes we put Mary on a pedestal that is removed from the difficulties of life. Yet, when she was chosen by the Father to be the mother of Jesus, her faith in God enabled her to accept what the Father had called her to be, a sign for all of us. Even at the age of fifteen, in a male dominated society, she accepted her mission and showed us how to be faithful to the Lord.

It seems that our world is getting more and more complicated, especially with all the negativity that is occurring. It is so easy to get lost in all of this. Yet, we need to keep coming back to what is essential in our lives, and that is the presence of Jesus who calls us to fidelity and authenticity. Unlike the judge in today's Gospel, who was only concerned about himself, we are reminded that we also need to be concerned about each other. Building the kingdom of God on earth means that we recognize that we are connected to each other by the fact that we occupy the same planet. So then, we are challenged to use our gifts to help others experience the presence of Christ, whether they be family, friends or strangers. Most of us can accept this and live by this. Once we believe and live what we believe, then we can help others experience the presence of Jesus and do.

Paul, in his Letter to Timothy, reminds us to be persistent in what we do, not in a negative way, but in a way that will allow the love of Jesus to be reflected in our lives. Look at the saints. They were persistent in their activities because they believed that following Jesus was the only way to live. Jesus had the way to the Father and eternal life, and their lives were reflections of what their faith was about. The same can be said of us, if we are just as willing to let the Word permeate our being and be reflected in all aspects of our lives. This doesn't mean that we won't have difficulties in life; just that Jesus can help us deal with them. If we are all believers of Jesus, do we really have any other choice but to follow him?

#### Today's Gospel Meditation......

Luke 18:1-8

Jesus told the parable of the persistent widow and the unjust judge to give his disciples fresh hope and confidence in God's unfailing care and favor towards us (grace). In this present life we can expect trials and adversity, but we are not without hope in God. The Day of the Last Judgment will reveal that God's justice triumphs over all the injustices perpetrated by a fallen world of sinful people and that God's love is stronger than death. Those who put their faith in God and entrust their lives to him can look forward with hope and confident assurance. They will receive their reward - if not fully in this present life then surely and completely in the age to come in God's kingdom of righteousness, peace, and joy.

Jesus ends his parable with a probing question for us. Will you and I have faith - the kind of faith that doesn't give up or lose hope in God - but perseveres to the end of our lives - and to the end of this present age when the Lord Jesus will return in glory as Ruler and Judge of All? If we want to grow and persevere in faith until the end of our days, then we must nourish our faith with the word of God and ask the Lord to increase it. When trials and setbacks disappoint you, where do you place your hope and confidence? Do you pray with expectant faith and confident hope in God's merciful care and provision for you?

"Lord Jesus, increase my faith and make it strong that I may never doubt your word and promise to be with me always. In every situation I face - whether trials, setbacks, or loss - may I always find strength in your unfailing love and find joy and contentment in having you alone as the treasure of my heart."

#### What's Happening in 6<sup>th</sup> and 7<sup>th</sup> Grades?

Sixth graders started the school year learning about different topics in environmental science, including the different forms of pollution and how it affects our atmosphere. The class dug deeper into climate change and how greenhouse gases and carbon emissions are affecting our Earth. Afterwards, the students worked on a Carbon Emissions Project. Using a color-coded map, they looked at the total emissions by country, determined which countries produced the greatest carbon emissions and made conclusions based on their findings.

The second part of their studies included a discussion on the different types of renewable resources. Students learned about solar, wind, water, and other resources. They concluded their studies by creating an info graphic summary with the pros and cons of one of the resources of their choice. The study of environmental science with 6th grade promoted conversation about many current problems in the world, especially plastic pollution and climate change. Students brainstormed and shared possible solutions to many issues. It was great to see students thoroughly engaged in the discussions about our world, God's creation.

Seventh graders have been working very hard during the first few weeks of school. Students have been using their Sadlier vocabulary words to incorporate Language Arts skills into the writing of sentences for the unit words. Over the year, our students' reading and writing skills will "*evolve*" as they "*amass*" a "*prodigious*" list of terms to their vocabulary. The first three chapters in Social Studies link directly to what the class learned last year, making the sixth-grade material relevant to U.S. history, which is what they will be studying this year. In the upcoming weeks, students will be creating advertising campaigns to sell one of the thirteen original colonies.

#### What to Do When a Friend is Considering Abortion

When a woman is facing a difficult pregnancy, the reaction of the first person she tells tends to set the tone for her decision-making. How do we respond in a loving way that is life-affirming for both her and her baby? First, prioritize listening over speaking. Ask her about her feelings, thoughts, values, beliefs, and wants. Help her set goals that extend beyond her due date to help her see life beyond her pregnancy. Reassure her that she is not alone, and provide practical support. Pray with her, offering Christ's love at a crucial life-saving and life-defining moment.
