MESSAGE FROM THE PASTOR

Today is **CATECHETICAL SUNDAY**. The United States Catholic Bishops always declare the third Sunday of September to be Catechetical Sunday. It is a way to recognize the teaching ministry of the church. This year's theme is 'I **RECEIVED FROM THE LORD WHAT I HANDED ON 'TO YOU.'** This is from one of Paul's letters in which he reminds us that what he taught and what the church teaches is what the Lord has shown us. Today we recognize especially **NANCY CAPUTO, OUR DIRECTOR OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION, AND ALL OUR PARISH CATECHISTS** who bring the Good News of Jesus to our children, youth, young adults, and adults. The Good News is more than just what we hear and learn; it is also what we bring to all those we meet in our lives, for we are called to be the Good News for each other. What we teach must be consistent with what you parents teach your children, so there is a consistency in their lives between what happens at home and what happens in the parish Religious Education Program and in the Catholic School.


In today's Gospel, Jesus tells us the story of the landowner who hires workers to work in his vineyard. No matter how many hours they worked, he paid them justly. MESSAGE FROM FR. JOE Regarding Attending Mass during Covid-19

Dear Fellow Saint James Parishioners:

It is great to be back together in church for Mass, but things are a little different. Please don't forget to call the parish office or email me (jbarbone@msn.com) by noon on Saturdays to let us know which Mass you plan to attend. Senior citizens and those with underlying medical conditions are encouraged to remain at home and watch the Sunday online 10:30AM Mass, which we will continue to live-stream.

If you do come to church for Mass, please remember the following:

- 1. You must wear a mask to enter the church and you must keep your mask on at all times while in the church, including during Mass.
- 2. As you go from the Gathering Area into the church, please use the appropriate door to enter and exit the church.
- 3. Please observe the one-way aisles, which are marked with blue tape on the floor.
- 4. You must maintain social distancing while in the church.
- 5. Half of the pews have been taped off to maintain social distancing. There are pieces of blue tape on each pew where you can sit. They are also on the floor by the back walls for those who prefer to stand. This area is also marked for social distancing.
- 6. Family members can sit together, but everyone else must sit 6 feet apart.
- 7. The weekly collection baskets will not be passed from parishioner to parishioner. They will be on the baptismal font. Please drop in your donation as you enter or exit the church.
- 8. There is no procession of the bread and wine ("bringing up the gifts").
- 9. Please do not shake hands when giving the sign of peace. Instead, wave, nod, or bow slightly.
- 10. There are three Communion stations: one in the center, one by the organ, and one by the ambo. The ushers will direct you to maintain social distance.
- 11. When it is your turn to receive Communion, approach the priest or deacon, receive the Host in your hand, raise or lower your mask, and place the Host on your tongue. Immediately replace your mask over your mouth.
- 12. Hosts can no longer be placed directly on a parishioner's tongue by a priest, deacon, or Eucharistic Minister. You must receive the Host in your hand and place it on your tongue. There is no receiving from the Cup.
- 13. The candles in the Gathering Area have been turned off and they are taped.
- 14. There are no printed bulletins. Bulletins are posted online on the parish website.
- 15. The Worship books have been removed from church. You may bring your own booklet, iPad or IPhone to use during Mass.
- 16. You will also notice that everything that can be touched has been removed from the church. There is no Holy Water.
- 17. Once Mass is over, please quickly exit the church so that the pews can be sanitized for the next Mass.
- 18. If you want to socialize with others whom you may not have seen in a while, please do so outside of church and not in the Gathering Area.

If you have any questions or are unsure of what to do while in church, please ask an usher. I ask your patience as we attempt to navigate through all of this. We realize this is a very different situation for all of us. It can work if we work together. If you have any questions or concerns, please do not hesitate to let me know.



My Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

On September 20th, the third Sunday of September, the U.S. Bishops call us once again to celebrate Catechetical Sunday in order to recognize and support in prayer those called to serve our parish communities in the catechetical ministry. The theme chosen for this year is "I received from the Lord what I also handed on to you" which is taken from St. Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians. In each parish, those who are called to the catechetical ministry, as catechists, parish catechetical leaders, youth ministers, Catholic School religion teachers and leaders in our RCIA processes will be called forth to be commissioned for their ministry among us.

This year's theme recalls our responsibility as disciples of Jesus given to us at our Baptism to share what we have received. Through our words and actions we are called to witness and to share our faith with others and to strengthen the faith of those whose lives we touch.



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Gospel Reflection:

Matthew 20: 1-16

What can work and wages, welfare and the unemployed tell us about the kingdom of God? In the parable of the laborers in the vineyard we see the extraordinary generosity and compassion of God (Matthew 20:1-16). There is great tragedy in unemployment, the loss of work, and the inability to earn enough to live and support oneself or one's family. In Jesus' times laborers had to wait each day in the marketplace until someone hired them for a day's job. No work that day usually meant no food on the family table. The laborers who worked all day and received their payment complain that the master pays the late afternoon laborers the same wage. The master, undoubtedly, hired them in the late afternoon so they wouldn't go home payless and hungry.

Lord Jesus, fill me with your Holy Spirit that I may serve you joyfully and serve my neighbor willingly with a generous heart, not looking for how much I can get, but rather looking for how much I can give.

Feast of Saint Matthew. Feast Day: September 21. Patron Saint of tax collectors and accountants.

Matthew must have been surprised when Jesus walked up to him and said, "Follow me." He probably fell off the stool in his customs booth!

Matthew, also known as Levi, was a tax collector in the town of Capernaum. Most tax collectors were hated by the Jews because they worked for the Romans, who had conquered the land. A tax collector could use his position honestly or dishonestly. The temptation to use the position to become rich was great. Now do you think the choice of Matthew was surprising?

Yet Jesus chose a tax collector to follow him, to learn from him, and to go out and spread the Good News to others. The call from Jesus was more powerful than the call of wealth. Matthew left his work as tax collector. He invited Jesus to a dinner where other tax collectors (publicans) and sinners were gathered. The Pharisees were upset when they saw this, and they said to the disciples, "Why does your teacher eat with tax collectors and sinners?" Jesus heard them and replied, "Those who are well have no need of a physician, but those who are sick. Go and learn what this means, `I desire mercy, not sacrifice.' For I have come to call not the righteous, but sinners." (See Matthew 9:9–13.)

We know nothing other than that about Matthew from the Scriptures, but we do know that Matthew preached the Good News of Christ, and at least part of the Gospel attributed to him was first written for the Jewish converts in Palestine. There is some uncertainty about where Matthew preached and where and how he died. Some say Matthew went to Persia; some say Syria and Greece, while others say Ethiopia. Yet we can learn much from Matthew. He was a man who knew quite well the power of money. He knew the comfort it could ensure, the recreation it could buy, the luxury it could provide. But he was wise enough to know what it could not do. Money could never give him that sense of peace deep inside. It could never befriend him when he was lonely or give him the strength and courage to go on when all else seemed lost. Money could never buy him forgiveness or love. But the love of Christ could do all this and more.

Saint Padre Pio of Pietrelcina, Feast Day: September 23. Patron Saint of civil defense volunteers, adolescents, and stress-relief.

Critics of Padre Pio of Pietrelcina regarded him as an anomaly, a throwback to earlier times when Christians expected saints to do weird things. "I thought we left such legends back in the Middle Ages," said one incredulous observer. I suspect he had in mind saints like Joseph of Cupertino, who flew through the air at the sight of a statue of Mary. However, Padre Pio's many disciples regarded him as a saint as much for his charity, generosity, and tenderness as for the extraordinary mystical phenomena attributed to him.

Miracles happened every day of Padre Pio's life. Like other wonder-workers such as Francis of Paola, Pio freely contradicted inviolable laws of nature. He appeared in two places at the same time to help people in trouble. He summoned friends by mental telepathy or by causing them to smell the scent of violets, which was associated with his presence. He read people's thoughts and used that special knowledge to tease them. He dumbfounded people in the confessional by describing all their sins in detail. He accurately predicted future events, including his own death. He healed people of deafness, blindness, and incurable diseases. And for fifty years he bore Christ's wounds on his body and suffered enormously because of them.

How do we understand the appearance of such a "medieval" figure in our contemporary world? Perhaps we should not be surprised that God acts dramatically to get our attention when we lose sight of spiritual realities. God sent Padre Pio to us as a light to challenge the darkness of the mid-twentieth century and to offer hope to a world racked by depression and war.
