



MESSAGE FROM THE PASTOR

Needless to say, this has been a very different year, with COVID-19, Hurricane Isaias and the ongoing issue of Black Lives Matter. This past week we saw sports teams decide not to play games in opposition to the shooting of Jacob Blake in Kenosha, Wisconsin. God does not make distinctions, and neither should we. If we discriminate against one person, then we discriminate against all. The players demonstrated their condemnation of the racism that permeates our society. But it is up to us to see that racism does not pervade our thinking, our policies, or our actions. Every person is created by God and endowed with the dignity of his or her traditions, no matter what they may be. Racism has no place in our lives as followers of Jesus, and certainly no place in the life of the church. While it is true that every ethnic group that has entered this country has faced discrimination, that does not make it right. Just the opposite.

In the August edition of *The Catholic Spirit*, the newspaper of the Diocese of Metuchen, Pope Francis is quoted as saying, "...God has created us not as objects, but as people loved and capable of loving. He created us in his image and likeness. In this way he has given us a unique dignity, calling us to live in communion with him, in communion with our brothers and sisters, with respect to all creation. As Jesus' disciples we do not want to be indifferent or individualistic..." (p. 24). Can we do any less?

In today's Gospel Jesus is reminding us of fraternal correction. This is something that has been taught to us for years. If there is problem or difficulty between two of us, then we should try to resolve it between the two of us. Because the church was the center of life for all, if the problem could not be resolved between the two, then it was brought to the church. Today we bring problems to social media, so that everyone knows the problem and who is responsible. Talk about creating a monster. What happened to two people sitting down, having a conversation over dinner or a few drinks, and resolving their issues? Has respect for each other gone out the window, and is it better to let the whole world know about a problem between two people? That is hardly the respect for each other that Pope Francis was talking about.

We cannot solve the problems of discrimination in our country or in the world, or even in the church. But we can prevent it in our lives by the way we treat one another as valuable reflections of the presence of God. That is what we are called to be and to accomplish in our lives if we want to be faithful followers and disciples of the Lord Jesus. Look at it from this perspective. Do we have a choice?

As we celebrate Labor Day this weekend, it will be a different holiday because of the pandemic and school districts continuing to discuss options for educating our young ones so that both students and faculty are safe. Remember to wear your masks, and maintain social distance so that we will all stay safe, and drive this pandemic down.

MESSAGE FROM FR. JOE

Regarding Attending Mass during Covid-19

Dear Fellow Saint James Parishioners:

It is great to be back together in church for Mass, but things are a little different. Please don't forget to call the parish office or email me (<u>jbarbone@msn.com</u>) by noon on Saturdays to let us know which Mass you plan to attend. Senior citizens and those with underlying medical conditions are encouraged to remain at home and watch the Sunday online 10:30AM Mass, which we will continue to live-stream.

If you do come to church for Mass, please remember the following:

- 1. You must wear a mask to enter the church and you must keep your mask on at all times while in the church, including during Mass.
- 2. As you go from the Gathering Area into the church, please use the appropriate door to enter and exit the church.
- 3. Please observe the one-way aisles, which are marked with blue tape on the floor.
- 4. You must maintain social distancing while in the church.
- 5. Half of the pews have been taped off to maintain social distancing. There are pieces of blue tape on each pew where you can sit. They are also on the floor by the back walls for those who prefer to stand. This area is also marked for social distancing.
- 6. Family members can sit together, but everyone else must sit 6 feet apart.
- 7. The weekly collection baskets will not be passed from parishioner to parishioner. They will be on the baptismal font. Please drop in your donation as you enter or exit the church.
- 8. There is no procession of the bread and wine ("bringing up the gifts").
- 9. Please do not shake hands when giving the sign of peace. Instead, wave, nod, or bow slightly.
- 10. There are three Communion stations: one in the center, one by the organ, and one by the ambo. The ushers will direct you to maintain social distance.
- 11. When it is your turn to receive Communion, approach the priest or deacon, receive the Host in your hand, raise or lower your mask, and place the Host on your tongue. Immediately replace your mask over your mouth.
- 12. Hosts can no longer be placed directly on a parishioner's tongue by a priest, deacon, or Eucharistic Minister. You must receive the Host in your hand and place it on your tongue. There is no receiving from the Cup.
- 13. The candles in the Gathering Area have been turned off and they are taped.
- 14. There are no printed bulletins. Bulletins are posted online on the parish website.
- 15. The Worship books have been removed from church. You may bring your own booklet, iPad or IPhone to use during Mass.
- 16. You will also notice that everything that can be touched has been removed from the church. There is no Holy Water.
- 17. Once Mass is over, please quickly exit the church so that the pews can be sanitized for the next Mass.
- 18. If you want to socialize with others whom you may not have seen in a while, please do so outside of church and not in the Gathering Area.

If you have any questions or are unsure of what to do while in church, please ask an usher. I ask your patience as we attempt to navigate through all of this. We realize this is a very different situation for all of us. It can work if we work together. If you have any questions or concerns, please do not hesitate to let me know.

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

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Gospel Reflection:

What's the best way to repair a damaged relationship? Jesus offers his disciples spiritual freedom and power for restoring broken or injured relationships. What can we learn from Jesus' instructions about how to mend a damaged relationship? If you feel you have been wronged by someone, Jesus says the first step is to speak directly but privately to the individual who has done the harm. One of the worst things we can do is brood over our grievance. This can poison our mind and heart and make it more difficult to go directly to the person who caused the damage. The Lord Jesus wants to set us free from resentment, ill-will, and an unwillingness to forgive. The love of Christ both purifies and sets us free to do good to all - even those who cause us grief. The call to accountability for what we have done and have failed to do is inevitable and we can't escape it, both in this life and at the day of judgment when the Lord Jesus will return. But while we have the opportunity today, we must not give up on praying for those who cause us offense. With God's help we must seek to make every effort to win them with the grace and power of God's healing love and wisdom. Do you tolerate broken relationships or do you seek to repair them as God gives you the opportunity to mend and restore what is broken?

Lord Jesus, make me an instrument of your healing love and peace. Give me wisdom and courage to bring your healing love and saving truth to those in need of healing and restoration.

Feast of the Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Feast Day: September 8. Patron: All people named Mary, in any form.

We know that everyone has a birthday. The Bible doesn't say anything about Mary's birth, but we know that she was born. Like all parents, Mary's parents—we call them Joachim and Ann—probably took one look at their newborn daughter and knew that she was special.

Joachim and Ann loved God very much, and they were filled with gratitude to God for the gift of a child. They raised Mary as a child of God, teaching her to love and serve God. When the angel Gabriel told Mary that she had been chosen to be the Mother of Jesus, she already had great faith in God. Her strong faith and trust allowed her to say yes to God's plan for her. We cannot be certain what the future holds for any newborn infant, but we do know that the life of each person has meaning and purpose. When Mary was born, the world did not know who she was. Sometimes others—and maybe even you—don't see how special you are. Maybe you forget that God is calling you, too, right now, to do what Mary did—to bring Jesus into the world.



When we celebrate his mother's birth, we honor Jesus too. Today thank God for the gift of life, and give honor to both Mary and Jesus by showing respect and concern for one another—remembering that God has created each person with love and with a call to something very special in life.

St. Peter Claver. Feast Day: September 9. Patron of Oceania.

Have you ever been really, really thirsty? Maybe you were hiking or mowing the yard on a hot summer day. Maybe you just came in from the playground or off the basketball court. Think how good a drink of cold water would be. If some kind person brought you water, how would you feel? Peter Claver was that sort of person. Peter felt he was called to be a missionary. When he was 29 years old, Peter left his home in Spain and went to Cartagena (in what is now Colombia), South America. There he continued his studies and was ordained a priest.

Cartagena was the main market for the slave trade in the New World. Hundreds of thousands of people were brought there from Africa, herded into warehouses, and auctioned off to the highest bidder. They had been captured, chained together, crowded onto ships, and neglected during the long journey to South America. Whenever a ship carrying Africans arrived in port, Peter was there. He would greet the



slaves by giving them a drink of water. His first concern was to tend to their human needs—to ease their suffering and somehow restore their sense of dignity. He saw the suffering Jesus in the people he served. And he heard in their cry: "What you do for others, you do for me." Peter nursed many back to health and, while they were in warehouses awaiting their sale, he told them that Jesus loved them and gave them the sacraments.

Peter Claver could not eliminate the strong hold that slavery had on society. The hearts and the consciences of many people had been so hardened that they refused to see this evil of slavery in their midst. But Peter did what he could. He tried to be a visible sign that the African slaves were indeed human beings, children of God. By bringing the love of Jesus to them, he was laying the foundations of justice and charity for the future. During his 40 years in Colombia, Peter Claver baptized nearly 300,000 Africans.

A man of deep prayer, unbounded energy, and steady devotion, Peter Claver realized that it was his relationship with Christ that nourished his spirit and gave him the courage to go on when so many problems surrounded his work. When he died the city that had opposed so many of his efforts honored him.


PRAYER SHAWL MINISTRY

INTENTIONS FOR THE SICK

At the *General Intercessions* we pray for the sick. Our prayers for the sick are very important, especially in critical times of sudden illness, surgery or worsening condition. We will continue to pray for and mention the names of the sick. When the condition improves, please call the Rectory so that the name can be removed from the list.

COMMUNION AT MASS

If you cannot walk up the aisle to receive Holy Communion and do not want to sit in the first pew, please let one of the ushers know and an Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion will come to you at the end of the procession and administer the Body & Blood to you.

RECEIVING COMMUNION

A reminder that during the Covid-19 restrictions, the Eucharist can only be received in the hands. It is good to remind ourselves of the reverence needed when we receive the Body and Blood of Christ.

When we approach the altar please remove any gloves beforehand.

Remember to bow slightly without being ostentatious and reply "Amen".

If communion runs out, please wait in line for the Minister to return.

The ushers are available to assist you during the reception of Holy Communion and before / after Mass.
