

After Easter, you can opt into keeping a subscription to Hallow Plus for a 20% discount or continue on with the free content. No credit card required!

From there, you can either create a new account or log into your existing free account to be able to access Hallow Plus. We hope you'll use Hallow this Lent to help you get to know God through the last words of Jesus.

REFLECTION ON THE READINGS

When I hear the phrase, "The blind leading the blind," I think of the story of the two brothers on a park bench who were arguing about religion. The younger brother said to the older one, "You claim you know all about religion. I'll bet that you don't even know the Lord's Prayer." The older brother opened his wallet, put down ten dollars, and snapped, "This says I do."

The younger brother matched him, saying, "And this says you don't."

Jesus can, in a real way, become for us a beacon, a role-model, who offers us the best example of what it means to have a fully integrated life where words correspond with actions, and actions correspond to words.

Hopefully, we all want to live good lives.



Lent is a 40 day season of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving that begins on Ash Wednesday and ends at sundown on Holy Thursday. It's a period of preparation to celebrate the Lord's Resurrection at Easter. During Lent, we seek the Lord in prayer by reading Sacred Scripture; we serve by giving alms; and we practice self-control through fasting. We are called not only to abstain from luxuries during Lent, but to a true inner conversion of heart as we seek to follow Christ's will more faithfully. We recall the waters of baptism in which we were also baptized into Christ's death, died to sin and evil, and began new life in Christ. (United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, usccb.org)

The 7 Last Words of Christ

ARCHDIOCESAN LENTEN REGULATIONS

- 1. Days of both Fast and Abstinence during Lent are Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. If possible, the fast on Good Friday is continued until the Easter Vigil (on Holy Saturday night) as the "paschal fast" to honor the suffering and death of the Lord Jesus, and to prepare ourselves to share more fully and to celebrate more readily his Resurrection. The other Fridays of Lent are days of Abstinence. On a day of Fast, only one (1) full meal is permitted, and two (2) smaller meals, which, if added together, would not exceed the main meal in quantity. Those between the ages of 18 and 59 are obliged to fast. On a day of Abstinence, no meat may be eaten. Those who have reached the age of 14 are obliged by the law of abstinence.
- 2. The obligation to observe the laws of Fast and Abstinence "substantially," or as a whole, is a serious obligation.
- 3. The Fridays of the year, outside of Lent, are designated as days of penance, but each individual may substitute for the traditional Abstinence from meat some other practice of voluntary self-denial as penance.
- 4. The time for fulfilling the Paschal Precept (Easter Duty*) extends from the First Sunday of Lent, March 6, 2022 to The Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity, June 12, 2022.

*Canon 920 §1. All the faithful, after they have been initiated into the Most Holy Eucharist, are bound by obligation of receiving Communion at least once a year.



SYNOD ON SYNODALITY: "A LISTENING CHURCH"

Pope Francis has called for the people of God and clergy to convene and work together to listen and discern a vision for the future of the Church. Celebrating a Synod means walking on the same road together. The Synod on Synodality is intended to inspire people to dream about the church we are called to be.

There are three questions that we are asked to pray over and consider. The Synod Prayer is on the back of the flier:

- How is this "journeying together" happening today in your parish? How are we "walking together" as a Church, and what steps does the Holy Spirit invite us to take in order to grow in our journeying together?
- How are we "walking together" as the Archdiocese of Newark, and what steps does the Holy Spirit invite us to take in order to grow in our journeying together?



This Wednesday is Ash Wednesday. As a reminder, I will be in the church at 2:30PM to greet your children and wait with them for your arrival for the 3:00PM Service.

Q. Is Ash Wednesday a Day of Obligation?

A. Despite the often packed churches, you may be surprised to hear that the answer is no! Holy days of obligation commemorate a particular event (such as the birth of Christ at Christmas) or celebrate particular people (such as Mary's Immaculate Conception or the feast of All Saints). Ash Wednesday is a day of penance, fasting, and abstinence to begin the season of Lent. In a sense, it focuses on a concept rather than something particular and concrete.

Of course, repentance ought to be reflected in particular, concrete ways! That's one of the reasons that attending Mass on Ash Wednesday is a very good idea. It marks the beginning of a solemn season of penance. Despite all its comparisons to the desert, Lent can be very fruitful for our spiritual growth! Beginning this season with the celebration of Mass and the reception of ashes is a sign of our commitment to God and to spiritual growth.


