



WELLNESS MINISTRY

New Health & Wellness information sheets have been placed in the Wellness Ministry brochure holder on the table in the gathering area. This quarter topics that are discussed are the following:

- Bereavement Services: provided is a list of area parishes that offer Bereavement Groups, included are schedules of meetings and contact information. In addition are details on programs the Archdiocese offers for parents who are grieving the loss of their child.
- Healthy Recipes: Three Immune System Boosting Soup recipes plus two other healthy soups. One is a beet Soup and the other is a Garlic and Spinach Soup. All five recipes are a great way to get vegetables into the family's diet.
- Best Ways to Combat Seasonal Affective Disorder: During the winter months, especially here in the northern areas of our country, the shorter days of sunlight can affect a person's mood or give them a sense of lethargy. On average about 4% to 6% of the American population suffer from this disorder, with more people experiencing a milder form. About three out of every four cases belong to women. The handout will give you additional information on symptoms and approaches researchers have found to be beneficial.

St. Elizabeth Ann Seton Feast Day: January 4



The patron saint of Catholic schools, St. Elizabeth Ann Seton (August 28, 1774 – January 4, 1821) was born in New York City to a prominent family

prominent family of the Episcopal faith. When she turned 19, she married a wealthy businessman with whom she had five children. He later died of tuberculosis in 1803, leaving her a young widow. After discovering the Catholic faith in Italy, where her husband had died, she returned to New York and converted to Catholicism in 1805.

After several years struggling as a single mother, Elizabeth moved in 1809 to Emmitsburg, Maryland, where she founded the Sisters of Charity of St. Joseph, the first community for religious women established in the United States. She also began St. Joseph's Academy and Free School, which started a chain reaction of Catholic-based education in the United States that continues today.

St. Elizabeth Ann Seton was canonized September 14, 1975 in St. Peter's Square by Pope Paul VI and was the first citizen born in the United States to be given the title of "saint."





NORTH END BOY




A parishioner of St. Bartholomew's, Kevin Brady, has written a book called *North End Boy*, a memoir set in Elizabeth, N.J. Proceeds from book sales will be donated to St. Benedict's in Newark, which is featured in the book.

North End Boy tells the story of seven friends coming of age in 1978

against a backdrop of urban crime, abandoned factories and political corruption. Over a thirty-six hour period, the young friends struggle to find their place in a changing city and a changing nation. One gets into the family business. One moves out. One finds redemption in the Catholic Church. Another doesn't.

An intensely local book, North End Boy is also a larger meditation on post-war America, as seen through the eyes of a first generation American with immigrant sensibilities and working-class roots. It is also a story of Catholic conversion and redemption that takes place on the gritty streets of Elizabeth and Newark.


