

PASTOR'S COLUMN

REFLECTION ON THE READINGS



Today's Feast of the Epiphany tells two stories. The **first** story is about the world with an all-too-common theme: a power-hungry, politically ambitious ruler who was motivated by greed and the maintenance of rule. The **second** story is one of faith and the search for truth. **And I think that these are two stories that we can all relate to**.

It's not hard to see that Herod was someone who was overly preoccupied with the things of this world. He was concerned with how best to leave his mark and maintain his power; he was pensive with how history was going to remember him. The Magi, on the other hand, *look to the sky beyond their immediate world – beyond themselves - in search of truth.*

We can say that they follow this inner impulse of a God that led them on an incredible adventure.

I think that it's obvious that the Church wishes us to associate ourselves with these Magi, in the hopes of being led by that same inner impulse leading to the Christ child in a manger. But maybe there's a part of us that can relate to Herod and his preoccupation with the things of the world, things that can make our journey towards God less of a priority. Therefore, a good and sober question to ask ourselves on this feast is: What is it that's keeping us from progressing on our journey of faith?

Friends, in the life of every person - especially the Christian - there's this interior "star," if you will, which **calls** us and **leads** us to Christ. But the trick is we must *LOOK UP* and recognize its presence!

The "star" of our faith is always in the night sky of our lives.

May you and I acknowledge its presence by **looking up**, by **walking humbly** like the Magi, with **faith**, even in the midst of uncertainty and doubt. **May the Star of Faith always burn brightly in the night sky of your life.**

SECOND READING Ephesians 3:2-3a, 5-6



If you are in 8th grade or High School and are interested in attending this Summer's Youth Conference, please complete the interest form by using the QR code below.





EPIPHANY REMINDS US THAT ALL CREATION IS MOVED BY GOD

The star that appears over Jesus' birthplace is a reminder that the created world is not random, but guided by God himself.

The Catholic Church affirms that the entire universe is not a product of chance, but a fruit of God's love for humanity.

The feast of Epiphany reminds us of this belief, as Pope Benedict XVI points out in his 2009 homily:

The divine and universal law of creation is divine love, incarnate in Christ. However, this should not be understood in a poetic but **in a real sense**. Moreover, this is what Dante himself meant when, in the sublime verse that concludes the Paradiso and the entire Divina Commedia, he describes God as "the Love that moves the sun and the other stars" (*Paradiso*, xxxiii, 145).

Benedict XVI firmly believed that the universe was not random, but guided by the hand of God:

This means that **the stars, planets and the whole universe** are **not governed by a blind force,** they do not obey the dynamics of matter alone. Therefore, it is not the cosmic elements that should be divinized. Indeed, on the contrary, within everything and at the same time above everything there is a personal will, the Spirit of God, who in Christ has revealed himself as Love (cf. Encyclical *Spe Salvi*, 5).

When the star hung over Jesus' birthplace, it highlighted the fact that all of creation "orbits" around God, and gives praise to him.

Epiphany is a beautiful feast in the Church's liturgical year, challenging us to see creation in a new light and how that light can lead us closer to God.


