#### **PASTOR'S COLUMN**



#### **REFLECTION ON THE READINGS**

We know from experience that not all marriages reflect the ideal Jesus sets up in today's gospel. Many of us, in fact, may have fallen short of living out the ideal marriage or been victims of a broken marriage, still others have relatives whose marriages have not lasted. What is also true is the unfortunate ways in which we perpetuate the image of marriage. Albeit funny, they go

like this:

- Marriage Is a three-ring circus: engagement ring, wedding ring, and suffering.
- What's the difference between love and marriage?
   Love is blind and marriage is an eye-opener!
- Nancy's son wanted to know what It's like to be married. Nancy told him to leave her alone, and when he did, she asked him why he was ignoring her.
- This woman was really lonely, so she posted an ad on Facebook.
   The ad said, simply: "Husband wanted." She was surprised the next morning to find she had over a hundred replies. Unfortunately, they all said the same thing: "You can have mine."

Is there something wrong with the vision that Jesus lays out for us with regards to the institution of marriage? Is there something wrong with having an ideal? I don't think there is.

We have ideals in just about every facet of our lives. It makes sense that we should also have an attainable ideal in the most fundamental institution of society, what we call **marriage**. I don't think the struggles that we as a society experience with marriage has much to do with the idealistic vision that Jesus and His Church holds up for us. <u>I think</u> that the problem is with our vision...and in particular, our vision of marriage.

Friends, we must stop asking of marriage what God never designed it to give — perfect happiness, conflict-free living, and materialistic obsession. Instead, we should appreciate what God designed marriage to provide: partnership, spiritual intimacy and the ability to pursue God — together.


As we hear in our first reading and from Jesus in our Gospel reading this weekend, God did, indeed, create Adam and Eve for each other - to partner each other, to be mutually beneficial, to walk side-by-side through life, and to complement each other, **but they were never meant to complete each other. That's our vision...not God's.** I'm reminded of something St. Augustine wrote: "Our heart will never rest until it rests with you, God."



#### **UPDATE FROM JAMES McELROY**



Hello, everyone! My name is James McElroy, a parishioner here at St. James along with my family. As some of you may know, after seriously discerning a call to the priesthood in recent years, I was accepted as a seminarian for the Archdiocese of Newark in the Spring of 2023. So far on this

new journey, I spent most of the past year at St. Joseph's Seminary in Yonkers, New York, in what is called the Propaedeutic Stage". During those months, my peers and I were more immersed in prayer, service (to the elderly and homeless in NYC), and discernment than ever before. I feel that even beyond discerning whether God was calling me to be his priest, I was able to - little by little - become more aware than I ever have been of His profound love for me, despite my many great shortcomings; the Sacred Heart of Jesus is alive and is longing for each one of us.

In May of this year, I completed my time at St. Joseph's, and spent about half of the summer assigned to St. Paul the Apostle Parish in Greenville, Jersey City. While there, I was able to participate in the day-to-day life of a busy city parish under the guidance of Father Joseph Furnaguera. The people of St. Paul's were so good to me, and their loving witness - like yours motivates me deeply on this journey!

And now, in September, I am a few weeks into my time at Immaculate Conception Seminary in South Orange, where I (God willing) will be for the next few years of my life, studying philosophy and theology throughout my formation. This new stage will be different, but I am happy to continue the path and to recognize everything as a gift. I am among good company here at the seminary and know that there will be good fellowship as well as formation with my brother seminarians. I thank you all from the bottom of my heart for your prayers and your kindness! I thank Father David for the opportunity he has given me to share these words with you, and for the great example he continues to put forward. Please know of my prayers and love for you all, many of you whom I have known since my childhood!
